Forte Leads Cardinals To Top Championship

There was quite a celebration at Cardinal Mooney. The reason? The Cardinal Mooney boys soccer team by defeating Poughkeepsie Arlington in the crucial game, Saturday, Nov. 19 at Fauver Stadium, became the undisputed New York State champions, Division 'A'.

According to school sources, Cardinal Mooney is the first Catholic school to win the States' Soccer Championship.

The victory crowned a winning season that saw the Cardinals, under the coaching of Paul Forte, rack up a 22-1-1 record.

"The team is a group of unusual people," said a proud Sister Barbara Weyend, RSM, assistant principal. "They do more than talk, they act and care for each other when it counts."

Celebrations started on Saturday, Nov. 19 with a reception at Cardinal Mooney for team, parents and friends after the victory. Festivities continued Monday, Nov. 21 when administration and faculty honored Forte with a balloon-a-gram, cake and champagne.

Forte has been at Cardinal Mooney four years. Besides coaching soccer he teaches social studies. "He is a dedicated teacher and coach," Sister Barbara said and added, "It can be seen from the team's results."

Another celebration highlight was a proclamation from Donald J. Riley, supervisor, Town of Greece that proclaimed Monday, Nov. 21, 1983 as Cardinal Mooney Cardinals' Victory Day. The proclamation was read by Basil Marella, director of Parks and Recreation for the Town of Greece, who also presented Cardinal team members with medals.
