

Amnesty International Promoter Addresses Urgent Action Groups

Vincent McGee, the former University of Rochester student who became a "prisoner of conscience" in Amnesty International definition, returned to Rochester last week to encourage area residents to participate in AI programs.

McGee gained attention in the early 1970s when he refused to participate in Selective Service procedures. He was subsequently jailed and at that point was designated a "prisoner of conscience" by AI, the Lon-

don-based human rights monitoring group.

AI, he said in an interview, has "a specific mandate within the political realm in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights."

The international organization works in three areas: for the release of political prisoners and prisoners of conscience; for "a clear and open charge and a fair and open trial for any person accused of a political offense;" and, finally, for an end to cruel and unusual punishment, McGee said.

Amnesty International's work to end the death penalty is based on the last principle, McGee said.

"The international question of the moment is the reimplementation of the death penalty," he commented.

Individuals caught between conflicting political and human rights claims occupy most of Amnesty International's attention, and one of the most effective tools in resolving that problem has been the organization's Urgent Action Network.

In the diocese, Urgent Action commands a strong following among priests, women Religious and individual Church groups.

Through it, "we try to mount a campaign of 'moral suasion'," McGee said.

Notices of the maltreatment of political prisoners are sent to various groups which in turn write letters of protest to those responsible in foreign countries.

With the exception of the question of the death penalty in the U.S., Amnesty International prohibits U.S. members to work on or to research controversial cases in the U.S., McGee said. "On controversial cases here," he said, "Amnesty will send a trial observer, and it will be a foreign national," usually a Canadian or a Mexican.

In his own case, he said, "all the work was done in Holland."

The idea behind that, McGee said, is to "stay freed from politics on your own part to make the organization effective — in staying out of local issues."

He said it is Amnesty International's broad appeal to persons of many political stripes that makes it an effective champion of human rights.

Probe Nun's Death, Cardinal

Los Angeles (NC) -- Cardinal Timothy Manning of Los Angeles called Dec. 26 for an investigation by the Peruvian and U.S. governments into the death of

Columban Sister Joan Mary Sawyer, killed Dec. 14 while a hostage in a jail break attempt in Lima, Peru.

Peruvian President Fernando Belaunde Terry said after the nun's death that the shots fired at the escape vehicle were unauthorized and that those responsible for the shooting would be disciplined.

DFC Plans 'Messiah' For April 1

"The Messiah" (Passion and Resurrection sections) will be the annual production of the Diocesan Festival Choir this year. The presentation, marking the 10th anniversary of the choir's activities, will be performed at 4 p.m., Sunday, April 1, at the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse chapel, 4095 East Ave.

In Peru, however, following an investigation by a judge, the government announced that charges of negligent homicide had been filed on Dec. 26 against two top prison officials and seven police officers in the death of Sister Sawyer.

Judge Benjamin Madueno, who investigated the case, said prison officials and police were responsible for the shooting of Sister Sawyer. Charges were filed against Peru's national prison director, the inspector general of prisons and seven police officers. A trial was not expected for several months.

Rehearsals have been scheduled from 3 to 5 p.m., Sundays, at the SSJ motherhouse, beginning Jan. 8.

The cardinal made his plea in a homily at a Mass he celebrated with 30 priests in Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in memory of Sister Sawyer, a U.S. citizen who was born in Northern Ireland. "At the same time, we pray also for the gift of forgiveness for those guilty of this deed," he said.

Cardinal Manning said that Sister Sawyer "died the death of a martyr."

Sister Sawyer was killed after she and three other American nuns involved in prison ministry were seized as hostages by inmates attempting to escape from a Lima prison. Sister Sawyer, riding with the others in a van driven from the prison by the escapees, was killed when police began shooting at the vehicle. Eight prisoners also died.
