

BOOKS The Horror Goes On and On "No Place to Hide, at the time, opposes the use Now, nearly 40 years later,

"No Place to Hide, 1946-1984," by David Bradley. University Press of New England (Hanover, N.H. 1983). 217 pp., no price available.

NC News Service Except for the foreword by Jerome B. Wiesner, president emeritus of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Bradley's epilogue, this book reads like yesterday's newspaper. It is, in fact, a re-issue of a book originally published in 1948, giving Bradley's day-by-day account of the atom bomb tests carried out in 1946 at Bikini.

Although Bradley, an Army doctor and radiologist

at the time, opposes the use of nuclear weapons, his early account reads in most places more like high adventure than a warning.

Nevertheless, enough was learned through the testing for Bradley to conclude: "(1) There is no real defense against atomic weapons. (2) There are no satisfactory countermeasures and methods of decontamination. (3) There are no satisfactory medical or sanitary safeguards for the people of atomized areas. (4) The devastating influence of the bomb and its unborn relatives may affect the land and its health — and therefore its people - for centuries through the persistence of radioactivity.

there is no reason to change that assessment. Indeed, Bradley is much grimmer in his epilogue, today's bombs being so much more potent than those primitive bombs exploded at Bikini and the government having demonstrated its capacity for fudging the facts. In that regard, Bradley appears to have been prophetic, citing the danger posed by the failure to inform the public.

Wiesner, in his foreword, rightly notes that "in both the United States and the Soviet Union a mixture of fear, secrecy, technical arrogance, faulty military doctrine, ignorance, bureaucratic momentum, and outright falsehoods has sustained and fed a hopeless search for security through the ceaseless outpouring of more deadly weapons."

He also takes note of the denial syndrome — the refusal of the public to face up to the realities posed by nuclear conflict. Those realities are spelled out in brief but sober detail in Bradley's appendix dealing with the dangers of radioactivity.

All in all, this doesn't make for pleasant reading, but it does provide one more reminder of the need to search for ways, other than reliance on weaponry, of promoting peace.
