Youth Convocation Topics Listed

Catholic laypersons, Religious and clergy will be the presenters when Bishop Matthew H. Clark gathers diocesan teenagers for the first diocesan youth convocation, "Bishop Clark Challenges Youth," March 4 at Bishop Kearney High School. The bishop and his co-presenters will be asking the youths to think about their futures - as priests, Religious sisters or brothers, dedicated laypersons, parents and singles.

Bishop Clark will open the afternoon's proceedings by welcoming participants. Then, representative married couples, single persons, Religious and clergy will provide a panel discussion to give preliminary insights into the various broader vocations to which each person in ther assembly is being called by God.

An array of workshops will be offered with such topics as "My Faith and My Profession in Conflict: Can I Choose Them Both?" and "How Can I Join the Military and Still Answer the Bishops' 'Challenge for Peace'"?

Spiritual and personal-growth questions will be treated in such presentations as "Wholly Holy" developing your own spirituality; "If You Want Me, Love Yourself First"; "How Do I Know What God Wants Me to Do with My Life?"; "Keeping Your Faith in College: Opportunities to Grow" — where does one find a faith community, especially on the secular campus?

Practical applications of life and education, now and in the future, will be treated in several workshops. For example, in light of the Church, what may teenagers do in parishes to help out — to be included in parish life.

Preparation for the future will include some teens in a workshop answering the queston: What are some lay professions and careers for which I can prepare to dedicate to the Church?" or "are there valid lifestyles other than traditional religious life and families which can find my involvement — a presentation to include insight into "Catholic Communes — Lay Communities."


