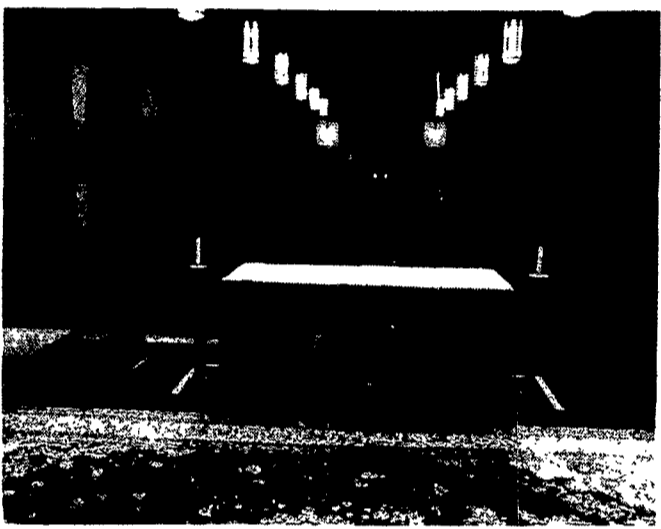
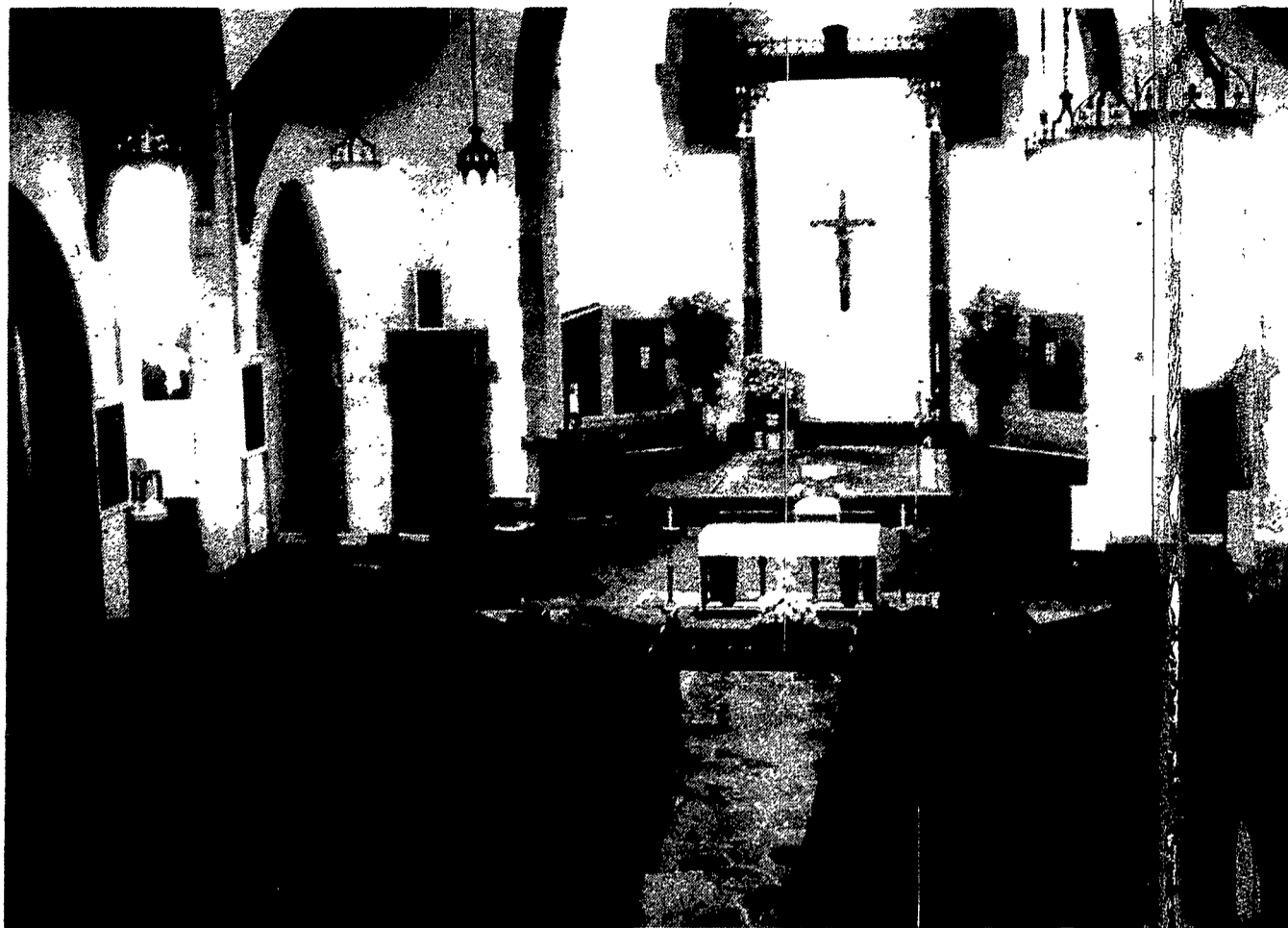


St. Patrick's Gets a Facelift



St. Patrick's Church, Seneca Falls, recently underwent a two-week restoration that highlighted moving the sanctuary some 50 feet closer to the congregation and turning the church's side chapels into wings off the main altar. St. Patrick's pastor, Father Michael Conboy said the renovations were made possible by a financial gift from a former parishioner, Mrs. D. Stanley Seibel of Florida. Also part of the "new look" is the restoration of all hardwood floors in the church, new carpeting in the sanctuary, additional lighting, and relocating the organ from the loft to a site within the congregation. Liturgy Office Will Host April School for Cantors

The diocesan Office of Liturgy will host a School for Cantors, sponsored by the National Association of Pastoral Musicians, April 23-27 at Keuka College in Penn Yan.

The week-long program is designed to provide education and training to parish cantors. Topics will include liturgical history, the Psalms,

musical skills, vocal training, celebration style and cantor repertoire.

The week will be coordinated by James Hansen, former cantor at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C.
