
Catholic Schools

The last week in February and the month of March will be recruitment time for the Rochester Diocesan Catholic Schools. Each school has its formula and timetable for registering youngsters in the various educational programs, like pre-schoolers and kindergartens, for the 1984-85 school year. For information concerning dates, times and locations contact your parish, elementary, secondary schools or Office of General Education at 328-3210.

Bus transportation is provided free by the school districts within a 15 mile limit. Parents wishing to register should present birth and baptismal certificates and immunization records.

The elementary and secondary schools of the Diocese of Rochester admit students of any sex, race, color, national and ethnic origin to all rights, privileges, programs and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the schools. They do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, national and ethnic origin in administration of their educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship and loan programs, athletic and other school administered programs.

Families in financial need, can apply for tuition subsidy through the school of their choice.
