### Questions **On Sex, Sin**

Dear Father,

Would you please state in your column the seriousness of masturbation -- venial or mortal sin and why; oral sex, the same thing; going all the way - I assume this is a mortal sin -- is this any more serious than oral sex? This would be with one person who was special as opposed to people who sleep with everyone.

#### C.M. I am an over-50 person. Dear C.M.,

The questions you ask look devastatingly simple but they are far from that. Let's take the first thing you mention -masturbaton. If your question really means "Is a person who commits masturbation guilty of mortal or venial sin?" I couldn't possibly give an Rome cently addressed the matter of masturbation and has said it is "a grave disorder." Taken totally in the abstract I suppose that is rather easy to see if one specifically ordains all sexual activity toward procreation. Today, many experts regard masturbation as a simple reaction to situations involving negative emotions. In that context, we are still speaking of a kind of disorder but it is not a moral disorder. It is a grave disorder to be unable to cope with normal situations because of a serious phobia (fear). We do not call that a moral disorder. In the same way, masturbation can very easily be a disorder which is not, however, a moral one. I choose not to deal with your question on oral

Let me quote from a book by Eugene Kennedy, 'What a Modern Catholic Believes about Sex'': "The favorite line used to justify these relationships in a sort of general way goes something like this: Love is the sole rule of morality. This is the kind of logic used in what is known as situation ethics and it is a highly popular, if not deeply inspected, line of reasoning. The difficulty is in understanding whether the individuals who invoke love this way really grasp its meaning or its consequent set of responsibilities. All too often this is not the case. What is called love is merely some sort of subtle
