Will Deliver Atwell Lecture At Family Life Conference

Coretta Scott King will be the main speaker at a special conference, "Challenges, Opportunities and Dilemmas: The Changing American Family," Sunday, April 8, at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church, 141 Adams St.

Mrs. King, president of the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Non-Violent Social Change, will deliver the 1984 Father Henry Atwell Memorial Lecture at that time.

The program is under the egis of the Rochester Commission on Interfaith Cooperation, an assembly of churches and synagogues, a joint agency of the Jewish Community Federation and the Genesee Ecumenical Ministries.

Rabbi Judea B. Miller is chairman of the conference.

"That the family today is in peril is generally acknowledged. With rising problems of divorce, separation, single parent families, changing sex ethics, families of all

races and religions are challenged now as rarely in the past," Rabbi Miller commented recently.

He said the conference will raise such questions as "What is the role of religious institutions in this area? How could and should they respond to radically new styles of life, changed values, new situations and problems?



The program is a modern liturgical service shaped by contemporary American jazz. It contains congregational singing of antiphons, organ and choir music, some chant, some ensemble music and an acappella canticle for choir. Father James Lawlor, pastor, will preside at th Old St. Mary's Church service. Sister Susanne Hoffman, Catholic chaplain at thr university, will preside at the Interfaith Chapel service.
