

# Medaille House Program Looks to Expansion

The Sisters of St. Joseph are accepting new applicants for their Medaille House program which consists of Sisters and lay women who desire to share Christian community and engage in works of faith and justice.

In August last year, the first house of this kind opened in the city. Participants in the venture agreed that the first year has gone

well and, in August this year, at least one new community home is expected to open.

Women who participate in the program make a one-year commitment to live in a faith-based Christian service community. Applicants must be over 21, with a mature personality and have reasonably good health.

Willingness to live a simple life-style based on Christian

principles is also a prerequisite for being in the program.

Financial arrangements are worked out on an individual basis. Each person has the option of renewing the one-year commitment at the end of the first year.

"Medaille" comes from the family name of John Peter Medaille, SJ, who in 17th century France, was instrumental in the beginnings of the Sisters of St. Joseph. His vision at that time included communities of persons "anxious to devote themselves in a special manner to prayer... and to works of charity for their neighbor."

The present community at Peck St. includes three Sisters, Sister Barbara Lum, assistant professor of nursing at the University of Rochester and nurse practitioner at Corpus Christi Health Center; Sister Marilyn Reeves, principal of St. John's School in Greece; and Sister Kathleen Weider, faculty member at Nazareth Academy. Lay women participating this year include Donna DelSanto, co-director

of Corpus Christi Center; and Carol Neighborhood Health and Outreach Center; Edith Findeis, director of religious education at St. Peter and Paul Parish; Teresa Snell, social worker at the Corpus Christi center; and Carol Thiel, nurse at Strong Memorial Hospital.

"We feel at home together, and have established a depth of community that we prize very highly," one participant remarked.

Calling such an approach "short-sighted," and characterizing it as a "hodgepodge expansion," he said it was decided instead to develop a comprehensive improvement plan that would meet both the short-term and longer range parish needs.

School expansion and renovations, expansions and relocation of the administration-rectory building and improvement in the church will be accomplished in that order, Father Connor said.

All projects will be accomplished as funds become available.

The program is under the leadership of co-chairpersons Michael Charleton, John McTigue, and Sharon Stiegman.

A volunteer committee of about 350 parishioners will be organized to solicit each family.

The drive will kick-off May 9 and continue to May 21. Father Connor plans to begin construction during the summer months.
