**Pope Defends Nation's Right To Use Arms**

Vatican City (NC) — Pope John Paul II has upheld the right of a country to use arms to defend human rights and preserve peace.

At the same time, the church favors "maintaining the primacy of political efforts founded on reason, conviction and values over the use of military force," he said April 8 during a Holy Year Mass in St. Peter's Square for more than 10,000 military personnel from 24 countries.

He noted that the church has "for a long time proposed overcoming the balance of terror through a more efficacious international organization," but upholds the right of nations to use arms "to discourage every violation of human rights or, in case of need, to re-establish order."

The pope told the soldiers,

many of them in uniform, that the morality of their profession was found in "this ideal of service to peace in single national communities and even more in its universal context."

He asked the servicemen to maintain "a fundamental Christian vision of life."

The pope concelebrated the Mass with prelates from around the world, including Archbishop Joseph T. Ryan of the U.S. Military Ordinariate.

About 600 U.S. servicemen attended the Mass, including 200 from the USS New Jersey, a battleship stationed off the Lebanese coast, and troops stationed in Italy and West Germany. Several U.S. servicemen participated in the Offertory procession and received Communion from the pope.

**Students Pursue Insights to Radiation**

Seniors at Our Lady of Mercy High School are getting a chance to discover the field of nuclear physics through a second year physics course dealing with nuclear physics and its effects on human beings, said Mrs. Mary Nickles, physics teacher.

The course consists of seven laboratory sessions plus a field trip to Cornell University to learn about the high energy physics research being done there with a particle accelerator.

Laboratory work for the course includes measuring the radioactivity using equipment borrowed from Rochester Gas and Electric and from the Monroe County Office of Emergency Preparedness.

As part of the course work, the students have measured background radiation of the school and Motherhouse. Mercy senior Vandana Naavati presented information on the findings at an area science competition at Nazareth College on Saturday, April 7.

"I'm taking this course because I think it will help me understand more about radiation and how dangerous it is," Vandana said.

According to senior Jane Coyne in taking the course she will at least understand the subject. "My belief is that the fear and concern about the uses of nuclear power and all activities including radiation stems from ignorance."

**Viewing Rochester In Boom Town Days**

An exhibition exploring the hows and whys of Rochester as a boom town, "The Lion at the Falls: Waterpower and the Rise of Rochester," opens Saturday, April 21 at the Rochester Museum and Science Center. The exhibit, open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and 1-5 p.m., Sundays and holidays, will run through Jan. 28,

1985. Admission is \$1.50 for adults, \$1 for senior citizens, and 50 cents for students through high school. RMSC members and preschoolers, admitted free.

Included in the exhibit is a modern water-driven wheel that demonstrates how mill power trains functioned, details on the city's rapid growth between 1820-1840, tools related to milling, blacksmiths, wheelwrights, wagon makers, harness makers and saddlers.
