We Get More Deacons Saturday

Bishop Matthew H. Clark will ordain 10 men to the permanent diaconate and one man to the transitional diaconate, 11 a.m., Saturday, April 28, in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

The permanent diaconate candidates are Peter Battisti, Charles Birx, John M. Boburka, Thomas J. Driscoll, John Giugno, Joseph P. Holleran, Richard E. Mahany, Dr. Fernando V. Ona, Michael J. Piehler, and John E. Zierle.

Patrick Sullivan, a fourth theology seminarian, will be ordained to the transitional diaconate in the same rites. Bishop Clark recently established a new policy on diaconate ordination. According to Father Thomas J. Valenti, diocesan director of seminarians:

When Bishop Matthew H. Clark ordains the new permanent deacons, he will also ordain Patrick Sullivan as a transitional deacon, one pursuing ordination to the priesthood.

He is the youngest of five children, the son of Edwin and Mary Helen Tischer Sullivan of Victor.

His seminary experience includes Becket Hall, St. Bernard's Seminary and Immaculate Conception Seminary in Mahweb, N.J.

His ministerial education includes CPE at St. Joseph's Hospital in Parkersburg, W. Va., and St. Andrew's in Rochester. Following his ordination he will spend a month at the diocesan mission in Tabasco, Mexico, and then will begin his deacon-internship.

1,000 Attend Chrism Mass

"We expressed strong concern about the budget cuts, especially as they affect the poor," in particular such groups as the elderly and women, Bishop James W. Malone of Youngstown, Ohio, NCCB president, told reporters outside the White House following the luncheon and a subsequent series of private briefings by administration officials.

Bishop Malone said that on El Salvador the bishops reiterated that "the only solution to war is a political solution as contrasted with a military one.'

Archbishop John O'Connor of New York, chairman of the Committee on Social Development and World Peace of the U.S. Catholic Conference, public policy arm of the bishops, said the luncheon and briefings covered issues on which the bishops both agree and disagree with administration policy.
