On the Right Side

CBS Program 'Beautiful!'

Did you see the TV program on Pope John Paul II Easter night?

You bet your bottom dollar I did. It came over station WHFC, Rochester, a CBS presentation. I was pleased at the amount of advertising given ahead of time. TV Guide, which has a circulation of 17,275,000, gave four pages to the picture, emphasizing the actor Albert Finney who took the part of the pope. Many parish bulletins alerted parishioners. I phoned several persons shortly before the program began to remind them. Everyone replied: "Oh, we're all settled in to watch it."

What did you think of the program?

After the diet we were fed last year, with the sexy "Thorn Birds" and the more sexy "True Confessions," plus Father Greeley's even more sexy clerical novels, it was a blessed relief to see the Church and her priests and hierarchy presented as good, human, dedicated men, devoted to their vocations and faithful to their vows; and the pope so consciously the Vicar of Christ. Beautiful!

What did you think of Albert Finney's portrayal of Pope John Paul II?

The last time I visited New York was 20 years ago, and I saw Finney in his Broadway production of "Luther," which he played for five years. He portrayed Luther fairly, I think: a gifted, religious, intolerant, tormented reformer who rebelled against the terrible scandals which scourged the Church, and who always had a doubt about his own work. In an interview about his portrayal of Pope John Paul, Finney said, "I'd done a lot of research on Catholicism when I did 'Luther' some 20 years ago. But our religious adviser on the film in Rome said something I keep in mind: And it isn't easy for me. He said that Wojtyla sees and feels God everywhere and in everything. Now, that's

hard for me to do." Considering that his personal life has been closer to the "Tom Jones" he so exuberantly portrayed in the movie than it has been to much holiness, it is an impressive observation, and I pray that it will help to bring him to the Faith and a love of the Church. He professes to belong to the Church of England, nominally, and remarked, "which I suppose is just noncommitted Protestant." I haven't the slightest idea what he means by that remark. From what I have read and seen of Pope John Paul, I think Finney manifested well the spirit and personality of the pope. And Michael Crompton who took the part of the young Wojtyla was very credible. I wrote CBS: "Thank you for the Easter showing of 'Pope John Paul II.' I hope you will run it again."

Then you missed "Bless Me, Father" at 10 p.m. on PBS?

Not at all. Father Cushing at St. Cecilia's has a videotape machine. I phoned him: "Will you tape the Pope John Paul picture on the video. In the April 18 Courier-Journal, historian Father McNamara wrote: 'Catholic viewers who have not yet discovered 'Bless Me, Father' are missing one of the gentlest and most hilarious series that television has ever aired.' It's a funny spoof, somewhat in the spirit of the Bing Crosby and Barry Fitzgerald pictures, and brings chuckles and a spirit of good will. And it is clean, great humored fun. There is a total of 23 episodes. Do catch it Sundays. You will love the Church better for it. So rather than lament all the junk in TV wasteland, give praise and credit for the good. And drop a line or phone your appreciation to the producers and the advertisers."
