# **Church Takes Lead Role** In Care for Prostitutes

The diocesan Sisters of St. Joseph, the Catholic Family Center and several parishes have assumed leadership roles in the city's efforts to aid prostitutes find new lifestyles.

To date, there are three major programs under the general egis of the Prostitution Task Force.

The first, Project Yes, is sponsored by the Rochester Police Department and is targeted for prostitutes 12-20 years old. The program title means "Project to Prevent Youths Being Exploited Sexually."

The second is Project More (More Options Really Exist) for women 21 and older. This is sponsored by the Sisters of St. Joseph and Catholic Family Center.

The third is Better Way Community Outreach, a coalition of local churches offering housing and support to youths involved in prostitution.

Project More is headed by Sister Eileen Conheady, SSJ. The program offers free outreach, career counseling, educational counseling, crisis intervention and community awareness, according to a brochure available from Catholic Family Center.

made donations, are really taking a leading role in this ministry to women who prostitute.'

The More brochure asserts that 30-50 percent of women in jail and prison have been prostitutes; that 70 percent of the women in prison were first arrested for prostitution. The brochure also says "Many women get into pro-

stitution in their teens; most women get into prostitution for economic survival: some women prostitute for other reasons: love, habit, fear, a need for belonging.

In addition, the brochure

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says that "Many women would like to change their life style, but need help to change.'

It is that help which Project More provides. Persons may refer themselves to the program, or be referred by service agencies, the judicial system, churches, neighborhood groups and individuals. Further information is available by calling (716) 546-6206.

The project's slogan is, "At More, we realize it's hard to change, but we know it can be done. It can be a new life!"
