Many of our sisters and brothers live and work among the poor and daily see the adverse effects of the increased production of arms. Scarce human and natural resources are employed for the production of weapons. There is increasing unemployment and inflation. Less is being spent in the developing countries on adequate food, water, health, education and housing. In many countries there is growing tension, violence and isolationism which hinder true human growth. Human suffering is increasing everywhere.

From this experience we appeal to all people to recognize their common relationship in God, and to find again the spiritual roots of peace in true harmony with God, with their neighbors and with themselves. We appeal to all people, but especially to our own sisters and brothers, to realize that war and violence begin in the human heart, and that our . efforts for justice and peace must be accompanined by fasting and prayer to cast out this devil from our midst, as the Lord has told

We are convinced that peace will be created only when there is a just distribution of the earth's resources. We appeal, therefore, to all people, but especially to our own members, to use and share



people of good will to urge the leaders of nations) to engage in serious negotiations to end the proliferation of arms, to reduce the world's stock of weapons and to redirect the world's

resources to peaceful purposes. Only the concerted efforts and prayers of all people of goodwill achieve a lessening of mistrust and tension in our world.

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
