Romero Probe Promised

San Salvador, El Salvador (NC) -- El Salvador's new attorney general, a leading member of the right-wing ARENA party, has promised a thorough investigation into the 1980 murder of Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador. "I am not going to hide anything in the investigations under my control as attorney general," said Jose Francisco Guerrero, 47, who was elected attorney general by the National Assembly June 5.

Archbishop Romero was gunned down on March 24, 1980, as he celebrated Mass in a San Salvador hospital chapel. No suspects were ar-


Special Camp

Redistribute Resources, Pope Asks

Vatican City (NC) -Governments, individuals and the church must work for an equal distribution of world resources, Pope John Paul II said June 4.

"Every day finds a large proportion of the world's population suffering from a shortage of food and medical assistance, from a lack of shelter, education and employment opportunities," the pope

"The situation presents to governments, individuals and the church alike the challenge of striving to rectify the unequal distribution of human re-.sources," he said.

Pope John Paul made his remarks as Malawi's new ambassador to the Holy See, Linnaeus Kauta Msiska, presented his credentials.

Msiska cited the pope's "firm commitment for peace, freedom and justice.'
