Recent statistics, published in "Broadcasting" magazine, reveal EWTN as the leader in cable growth among the top 25 basic services, showing a 47.4 percent increase in subscribers from December 1983 to May 1984. The network was also first in subscriber growth among religious networks for the preceding year.

Canada Preps for Papal Visit

Toronto -- Pope John Paul II's meeting with Polish-Canadians during his visit to this archdiocese has been transferred from Varsity Stadium to Exhibition Stadium. Scheduled for the evening of Sept. 14, the event is expected to attract more than 50,000 people.

'We are very pleased, said Father Richard Kosian of Ottawa, rally co-chairman. "The pope wanted to meet the Polish community and in a larger place all those Polish-Canadians interested in seeing him will have a better opportunity."

In another development concerning the pope's visit to Canada, Canadian religious leaders have been asked to nominate those who will be invited to the ecumenical service with Pope John Paul II at St. Paul's Anglican Church here. The service on Sept. 14 will be by invitation only. Just more than 2,000 seats are available in St. Paul's and places will be allocated among 37 different churches and faiths in Canada. The number invited from each will reflect the proportionate size of that group on the Canadian religious scene.

'The religious leaders of the Canadian churches and the pope will officiate together at this prayer service," said Father Brian Clough, chairman.


