From September of 1973 through June of 1974 I had an experience of prayer and spiritual renewal for which I shall always be grateful.

In those months, I had the joy of making the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius in daily life. My commitment during those months was an hour of prayer of the Scriptures each day, another quarter of an hour reflecting on that prayer and a weekly meeting with Father Ed Malatesta, SJ, then a professor at the Gregorian University, during which I was expected to tell him about my prayer and experience of God, life and myself since our last meeting.

It was a turning point in my life for a number of reasons. Among those I think of tonight are:

- 1. The realization that for the Christian prayer nourishes life and life nourishes prayer; and
- 2. That a committed prayer life is an essential foundation for a life lived in the land of freedom to which our faith calls
- I admit with some reluctance, but in truth, that I do not always pray as I should. But I most certainly know my need to be a person of prayer and thank God and that experience in 1973-4 for the desire to keep working at it.

The biennial conference is open to all black Catholics and all those interested or involved in the apostolate to the Church in the black community, NOBC literature states.


