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## Nazareth Academy **Among Schools** President Lauds

Nazareth Academy was among 33 Catholic schools which along with 229 public schools have been cited by President Reagan for educational exellence.

In a speech Aug. 27 at a Washington ceremony honoring the schools, which were selected by the Department of Education and the Council for American Private Education and announced in June, Reagan called for a return to 'traditional values'' and study of "basic subjects.'

He said that Scholastic Aptitude Test scores had fallen from the early '60s to 1980," the year he was elected, but that the rate of decline has slowed.

And he tied educational problems during this nearly 20-year period to increasing government funding of education, a "crisis in our country" and "vacillation and self-doubt" in foreign policy, but added that "in the past few years our nation has seen a rebirth of vitality and freedom.'

'Let's remember one essential precondition for success: We cannot reach for the future without a firm grasp of basic educational tools and the importance of traditional

Reagan urged the school principals and other officials from the award-winning schools to "get our students back to the proper study of basic subjects.'

"We must insist that all our students master math, science, history, reading and writing -- the fundamentals of our civilization," he said.

"But it isn't just basic subjects that need to be taught," he added, "it's also basic values. If we fail to instruct our chilren in justice, religion and liberty, we will be condemning them to a world without virtue, a life in the twilight of a civilization where the great truths have been

He said that "in many schools, students are being taught the dangers of nuclear weapons and the burdens of national defense. Well, let's make certain they understand not only the price of defending America but the price of failing to," he added.

The National Catholic Educational Association and the National Education Association, a public school teachers' organization, have developed classroom programs on war and peace issues.

Public schools chosen for the honors were selected through the Department of Education, which Reagan once sought to abolish. CAPE, the organization selecting the private schools, is an umbrella organization representing such groups as the U.S. Catholic Conference and NCEA.
