## **Notions** Balance

Dear Father Hohman,

This is a follow-up to the question I asked about the Real Presence and why the tabernacle is not on the main altar any more. I am also confused by the Mass, because different people seem to have different attitudes toward it. Some people talk about the Sacri fice of the Mass and others the Eucharistic Meal or the Sacred Liturgy. I, of course, grew up thinking solely in terms of the Sacrifice of the Mass. Has anything changed in that regard?

Dear F.G. Last week I forgot to mention that the business of the Eucharist being in a side chapel is not entirely a new thing. If you were to go to the Basilica of Ss. Peter and Paul in Rome, you might be somewhat hard put to even locate the Eucharistic presence, since is it not found very close to the main altar. It is very definitely in a side chapel, and considering the number of side chapels in St. Peter's it might be somewhat difficult to locate.

It is still perfectly proper to refer to the Sacrifice of the Mass, although we can also refer to the Eucharistic Meal. These two, far from contradicting each other, are complementary and it's a question of "you can't have one without the other." As you remember from your catechism. Jesus \_ lost in the translation.

offered one perfect sacrifice to God for all humankind and that sacrifice cannot be repeated. In that one sacrifice, the salvation of the entire human race throughout history was assured. It was Jesus's total offering of himself to God's will, best expressed in the giving of his life. So it was not primarily his dying, but rather his giving of self which brought about the salvation of the world.

In the sacrifice of the Mass, we do not repeat that sacrifice, but we merely recall the one same sacrifice Christ offered on Calvary so that each and every one of us can come into contact with it through this external sign. In this contact, we are called upon to make the sacrifice of our own wills and to give ourselves to God in union with Jesus. This meal element expresses the idea that Jesus broke the bread of his life (remember, bread is a symbol of life) and gave it to us to nourish us, to love life into us. We are called upon to receive that bread and to share the bread of our own lives with others in order that we might be totally joined to Jesus in his saving

It should be remembered that Communion outside Mass is by way of concession, and that the norm is Communion within a congregation in the celebration of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. Otherwise the full meaning cannot be ascertained, and something is
