Walsh is head of the Adam Walsh Child Resource Center in Florida. Three years ago, his son, Adam, was abducted and brutally murdered.

In a series of local meetings, Walsh was the featured promoter of The Child Safety Resource Project, being established

in Monroe County, to teach children how to prevent molestation and abduction, and to help families who need guidance when such events occur.

The project is principally aided by Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York (MONY) and the Adam Walsh Center. It is drawing together several community agencies to develop educational programs and materials for children ages 5 through 13.

Eventually the educational materials will be

available to schools. churches, youth groups, day care centers and similar organizations, a MONY release stated.

According to Jean Gilbert, president of the Rochester Federation of Catholic School Parents, her organization will actively promote the project. She said last week that she has asked for school room materials on the subwill encourage in diocesan schools.

In an interview last week, Walsh cited statistics on the problem: 2,000 children a year are kidnapped and killed; about 50,000 children have been abducted and are still missing. In addition, it is estimated that 100,000 children each year are abducted by an estranged parent, he said.

## **Priests Council** Has Revised **Constitution**

of the diocesan Priests Council since the ratification of its new constitution by the priests and Bishop Matthew H. Clark took place here recently. New members elected over the Summer also were on hand.

The revision work was necessary to bring the council into conformity with the revised Code of Canon Law, which took effect the first Sunday of Advent, 1983. One of the main new requirements is that the council be half elected; the former council had been a totally elected body. Membership now consists of 11 elected regional representatives, one from each region; 3 elected representatives from among the Religious priests; 3 ex-officio members and up to 4 appointed members to be named at the discretion of the bishop.

The bishop is now the council president, as required by the new law. Other officers elected at the meeting here are Father James M..

3. to relate to the Diocesan Pastoral Council, Sisters Council and otehr consultative bodies in a manner consonant with the purpose of each.

The council will have standing committees that probably focus on the areas of justice and peace, ministry in general and priestly life -their exact names and composition to be determined.

At the meeting here, the bishop indicated several matters that he would be bringing to the council for deliberation and the delegates surfaced some concerns of their own for future agendas.

Bishop Clark also appointed the following to serve as diocesan consultors: Bishop Hickey and Fathers Latus, Bayer, James Moynihan, Wheeland and Weis.

The next meeting will take place at the Lionstone here at 10:30 a.m. Oct. 1.
