

Along The Way

With Bishop Matthew H. Clark



I had the joy this weekend of spending time with people in the Southern Tier. Although the calendar was fairly full the days were pleasant and relaxing. The weather was beautiful, the countryside impressive and the people of the region as generous and hospitable as ever.

The weekend's travel began on Friday morning at St. Mary's, Waterloo, for a teachers' convention for the Catholic schools in the Southern Tier and Finger Lakes region of our diocese.

Some 300 administrators and teachers and our diocesan staff celebrated the Eucharistic Liturgy.

Following the mass, Sister Edwardine Weaver RSM addressed the assembly and then I had the opportunity to speak on the day's theme, "Accepting the Challenge of Peace."

It was a pleasure to spend part of the day with a group of persons who have such an important mission in our faith community — the care and education of so many of our beautiful young people.

Our next stop was St. Margaret Mary in Apalachin. I had been invited to take part in what turned out to be a happy and

stimulating evening the central theme of which, like that of the morning gathering, was our pastoral letter on peace.

We enjoyed a dish-to-pass supper at 5:30. At 7:30 we went to church for a beautifully prepared evening prayer. I spoke for a half hour about ways in which the parish could study and respond to the pastoral letter. We concluded the evening with almost an hour of questions and answers and other sharing around the themes raised by the letter.

On Saturday morning Father Lou Vasile and I traveled about 100 miles west to St. Ann's in Hornell to join the Catholic Daughters of the Americas for their annual memorial Mass and luncheon. The Catholic Daughters' presentation of a generous gift for the education of our students for the priesthood offered me an occasion to update them on the excellent programs Father Tom Valenti and his co-workers have developed to foster vocations.

We stopped next at St. Vincent's in Corning on Saturday evening for the celebration of the feast of their patron, St. Vincent de Paul. The children of the parish were very active in the liturgy during which we celebrated a communal Anointing of the Sick.

It was a great pleasure to share the evening meal with the

priests and lay leaders of the parish. Many parishes have begun that practice and, I must say, I find it a delightful experience to relax with men and women who serve their parish communities in such a generous spirit.

Our final stop was a visit this morning to the Elmira Correctional Facility for Mass with about 100 of the inmates and our team of chaplains. If the rich themes of today's readings reminded us of the mercy and magnanimity of our God, the assembly this morning brought vividly to mind the reminder that all of us are beneficiaries in Christ Jesus of that mercy and great goodness.

Visits to such facilities always make a great impact on me. I came away deeply grateful to and proud of Sister Josepha Twomey SSJ, Mike Stanley and Father Ed Golden who are our chaplains to the prisoners of Elmira.

This sampling of the week's activities give you, I hope, some idea of the vitality and variety of the faith life going on in our 12 counties.

Please pray for the communities and persons I have mentioned here. You have the consolation of knowing you are a part of their prayer.

Regional Appeal Chairpersons Named

According to their regions, they are:

North Region: Mitchell Sepaniak.

Sepaniak and his wife Jean have three children. A member of St. Salome's Parish for 30 years, he is a retired department head of the Eastman Kodak Co. He has served as Thanks Giving Appeal regional chairperson for two years, and is involved in the parish Stewardship program.

SSJs Note 20th Anniversary of Brazil Mission

A liturgy held in the motherhouse chapel inaugurated the commemoration by the Rochester Sisters of St. Joseph of the 20th anniversary of their Brazilian mission recently.

Present for the occasion were immediate families of the past and present missionaries who have served in Brazil.

"Our gratitude abounds," said Sister Elizabeth Anne LeValley, superior general, as she welcomed the assembly. She cited the courage and vision of the congregational administration of 1964 which began the venture.

Members of the 1964 administration, Sister Agnes Cecilia Troy, former superior general, and Sisters Florentine MacCarthy, Mary Patrice Messner and Margaret Adelaide Owen, her council members, were present at the liturgy.

Sister Elizabeth Anne also thanked the families and friends of the missionaries as well as the diocese for support of the mission.

In his homily, Msgr. William Shannon, motherhouse chaplain, inserted a challenge to the

assembly. Using the theme of fraternal correction presented in the gospel, he suggested that an imaginary program called "Voice of Latin America" (similar to the "Voice of America") might include some fraternal correction.

"Does not," he quoted from the imaginary program, "the Christian gospel suggest... that the superabundance you have belongs not really to you, but to the poor? If you were to dare to become more poor, you would be able to eliminate poverty elsewhere."

He urged the group to face up to the prevailing mentality of "acquisitiveness and possessiveness that could destroy us and our future." He urged all to learn, as have the returning missionaries, that "there is much to be done and much to pray for."

Speaking of the critical need for the United States to "learn from South and Latin America and listen to the voice that has so long been ignored," he maintained that this learning is essential if we are to move into a future based upon "love, solidarity and human strength."

Following the liturgy, there was a supper at which reminiscences were shared and family acquaintances were renewed.

A highlight of the day was

a phone call which came in just before the beginning of the liturgy. It was from the Sisters in Uberlandia and the three Brazilian postulants.

They sent their "thoughts,

wishes, prayers, and *abracos* to all their religious community, family and friends gathered in Rochester.

The official commemoration of the anniversary

will be marked by a celebration in Paranaaguara, Brazil, Dec. 7. Sister Rosalma Hayes, the first director of the mission project will attend the event.
