Nun Resigns as Consultant On Role of Women Pastoral

By NC News Service A nun-theologian has resigned as a consultant to the committee of bishops preparing a pastoral letter on the role of women in the church after signing a newspaper advertisement which declared a diversity of Catholic opinion on abortion.

Sister Anne Carr, who teaches systematic theology at the University of Chicago and is a member of the Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary, resigned after the ad appeared in The New York Times Oct.

"It had become apparent that my signature on the statement on pluralism and 'abortion constituted an impediment to my membership for some of the bishops," Sister Carr said in an interview with the National Catholic Reporter.

She also told the newspaper that her resignation was "mutually agreed on by Bishop Joseph Imesch and me." Bishop Imesch of Joliet, Ill., is chairman of the committee, which plans to have the pastoral completed by 1988.

She declined to comment further when contacted by National Catholic News Service.

The New York Times ad, headlined "A Diversity of Opinions Regarding Abortion Exists Among Committed Catholics,'' was signed by 96 Catholics.

It declared that a diversity of opinions on abortion was possible and called for dialogue within the church to discuss the differences. Bishop Imesch told NC

News he was not surprised by Sister Carr's resignation but said he was "disappointed."

She offered her resignation during the third week of September, Bishop Imesch said. The bishop said the nun

had brought the ad to his attention and "she thought it could be an embarrassing situation."

He added that no pressure had been put on the nun to resign by any members of the committee. "I don't think anyone on the committee agrees with everything the others think."

Sister Sara Butler of the Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity was named to replace Sister Carr. Sister Butler received her doctorate in systematic theology from Fordham University in New York and serves as head of her order, based in

ment Philadelphia. d by Bishop Imesch said the addition of Sister Butler was "a good, excellent" choice, and added "she was someone we had considered from the very beginning."


