


Guadalupean Gala

There Are Many Ways To Share

"Peace on earth..." And let the earth be glad...Christ is born..." Such are typical words on any number of Christmas cards which we receive year after year. These words almost seem trite in light of what is happening in our world today. We are tempted to ask, "What difference does it make that Christ was born?" and we may see the message of 'peace on earth..." as being an insurmountable challenge.

But we are a people of faith and a people of hope. Yet, we are also a people who confront constant suffering in our world.

This year as we approach Christmas our human family is plagued by famine in Ethiopia, conflict in Central America, chemical disaster in India, unemployment in our neighborhoods and families, homeless persons on the streets and record numbers of people living below the poverty line. These situations and others make me feel uncomfortable. Yet in light of this we cannot lose hope in the 'promises of peace." Peace has to start in our everyday life, not just conveniently at Christmas time. Peace must be lived in our minds, hearts and actions, in season and out of season.

In words echoed by John Paul II and the U.S. bishops, Pope Paul said, "if you want peace, work for justice." This means simply that the values which we celebrate at Christmas and in the coming of Christ,

must become an integral aspect of our economic, social and political institu-

The numerous ways that people respond to charity are commendable, whether it be giving to the Catholic Charities / Courier-Journal Appeal for the 100 neediest causes, or the relief for those suffering in Ethiopia or spending the night as a volunteer in a shelter for the homeless. There are so many ways to share. However, it seems at Christmas time we are bombarded with appeals, and indeed, we do give in a spirit of "Christmas," but that simply isn't enough. Once the Christmas season is over, we tend to become less attuned to the needs of people.

As I reflect on the constant and current suffering in our world, I am reminded of a section of the peace pastoral, "Shapingan Peaceful World." The bishops challenge us to see our world as a human family, while at the same time ask us to move beyond our personal sense of generosity and compassion and into a support for policies which promote global justice.

The values which we celebrate in the Christmas season find their roots in scripture and are cited by the bishops as key elements to peacemaking in our world. Christmas is a time when we are reminded that we fall short, but that we can begin again with renewed hope and a sense of vision, to work on building a just and peaceful world day-by-day, everyday, and


