Bishop Hubbard Wins Block on **Abortion Clinics**

Albany - State Supreme In addition, Bishop Hub-Court Justice John Pennock has barred the State Health Department from an issuing an operating license to Planned Parenthood which would offer abortions at clinics here and in Hudson.

The temporary cou<u>rt</u> order was obtained by the Roman Catholic Bishop of Albany. Lawyers for Bishop Howard J. Hubbard obtained the order late Friday, hours after two Planned Parenthood clinics had obtained approval from the State Health Department to provide abortions.

Bishop Hubbard was quoted as saying, "The Catholic Church in the Diocese of Albany remains unswerving in our commitment to protect the life of the defenseless unborn. We will continue our strong opposition to the abortion-ondemand philosophy which the proposed Planned Parenthood abortion clinic represents and we will expand our already substantial services which provide alternatives to abortion."

bard said the health department failed to follow correct procedures in justifying approval of Planned Parenthood's application.

It is thought the diocesan action may be the first such effort in the country.

It is also the first time the diocese has sought legal remedies against abortionists.

The debate has been underway for some time. The health department, the licenser of health facilities and services, first approved Planned Parenthood's application to offer abortions at two clinics Dec. 23, 1983.

Since that time, protests arose in which it was contended the department had not adequately publicized the proposal, and that contrary views were not given a forum.

The department then held a public hearing Nov. 9 in Albany.

At that time diocesan representatives said the department had not met the three criteria for approving

an application: surveying the need for abortion services; investigating Planned Parenthood's finances; and assessing Planned Parenthood's competence to perform abortions.

Vatican City (NC) -- Pope John Paul II has named Auxiliary Bishop Tadeusz Goclowski of Gdansk, Poland, as the new head of the diocese, the Vatican announced Dec. 31.

Gdansk is the birthplace of Solidarity, the outlawed Polish trade union which was formed independent of the Communist Party.

Bishop Goclowski, 53, had previously been apostolic administrator of Gdansk. He succeeds Bishop Lech Kaczmarek who died July 31.
