Pope Calls Extraordinary Synod

Vatican City (NC) — Here is an NC News translation of the Vatican text of Pope John Paul II's Italian-language announcement of an extraordinary Synod of Bishops Jan, 25 at the end of Mass at the Basilica of St, Paul-Outside-the-Walls.

At the end of this eucharistic celebration of the feast of the conversion of St. Paul, which finds us gathered here by the glorious tomb of the apostle, at the conclusion of the octave of prayer for Christian unity, an event comes to the consciousness of each one of us. This year marks the 20th anniversary of the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, the first announcement of which, we well recall, was given by my predecessor John XXIII of venerable memory exactly here in this basilica, on this same date, Jan. 25, 1959.

The Second Vatican Council remains the fundamental event in the life of the contemporary church. It was fundamental for deepening of the wealth entrusted to her
