

# \$85,000 Support Drive Starts Today at DeSales

Geneva -- DeSales High School announced that four Finger Lakes area residents have been named co-chairpersons of this year's \$85,000 support campaign, which kicks off today.

The four are Timothy J. Buckley, Dr. Edgar D. Prindle, and Anne H. Quigley of Geneva; and Teresa N. Dendis of Waterloo.
