The Toast

Mervyn J. Huston in researching his book, "Toasts to the Bride and How to Propose Them" (from which many of the following hints are taken), found that there is an increasing tendency to direct comments of the toast to the couple rather than to the bride. If the toast is to the bride, however, be sure to make some comments about the groom. He is getting married also and should not be the forgotten man, and don't overdo the part about how lucky he is.

Usually it is the best man who offers the toast to the wedding couple. However, others like a favorite uncle or long time friend may also be asked to toast the happy couple. The occasion can be a nervous one especially for the person who is not used to the limelight, and of course the person giving the toast wants what he says to be just right for the occasion. Throughout this bridal section there will be hints as to how to accomplish this, along with quotes and ideas to help the toast-giver.

When the person giving the toast has completed his remarks it is time for the formal toast. It is the function of the person giving the toast to direct and coordinate this part of the ceremony. Don't rush it. If the audience is seated face them and say "And now, ladies and gentlemen, I shall ask you to rise." Give them time to do so. Then turning to the couple with your glass raised to them say, "We wish you health and happiness in the years that lie ahead."


