

## Teen Pregnancy Hearings Planned

A series of public hearings has been scheduled this month to gather ideas from Rochester area residents on how to prevent adolescent pregnancy and assist teenage parents in Monroe County.

The state legislature has

appropriated \$4.75 million to expand or create community programs that provide health, educational, vocational or social services to adolescents at high risk of pregnancy, as well as to adolescent parents.

A coalition of human service organizations and concerned individuals joined last October to identify service needs, recommend program priorities and seek funds from the state to fund these priorities. If successful in securing funds, the group will evaluate program proposals submitted by local organizations. The public hearings are to ensure that the group's recommendations accurately reflect the concerns of residents.

The hearings are open to all county residents. The goals and strategies developed by the coalition will be available at the meetings. Anyone with questions concerning the hearings or who need other information should contact the county Department of Social Services at 442-4000, ext. 2672.

Community groups participating include Action for a Better Community, the County Health Department, Department of Social Services, City School District, Urban League, Planned Parenthood of Rochester and Monroe County, Finger Lakes Health Systems Agency, the Rochester Catholic diocese and the Ibero-American Action League.

### Sister Mary Climacus Hosenfeld

Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated for Sister Mary Climacus Hosenfeld of the Sisters of St. Joseph Feb. 7 at the congregation's motherhouse. Sister Mary Climacus died Feb. 4, 1985 at the age of 87.

A native of Webster, Sister Mary Climacus entered the convent from Holy Trinity Parish in 1918. She had certification for teaching in the elementary schools in the state, and taught in diocesan schools for 57 years.

Among her assignments were St. Theodore in

Rochester, Guardian Angels in Henrietta, St. Alphonsus in Auburn and Immaculate Conception in Rochester. She also taught at St. Anthony of Padua and Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Rochester, St. Mary in Dansville, St. Rose in Lima, St. Mary in Canandaigua, St. Patrick in Seneca Falls, and St. John the Evangelist in Spencerport.

She retired in 1973 and remained at St. Theodore, her last assignment, until failing health prompted her to

move to the congregational infirmary in 1984.

She is survived by a brother, Leo Hosenfeld of Canandaigua; four sisters, Cecilia, Anges and Mildred Hosenfeld of Webster, and Mrs. William Mooney of Rochester; three sisters-in-law, Mrs. Ray (Augusta) Hosenfeld of Canandaigua, Mrs. Lawrence (Louise) Hosenfeld and Mrs. Stanley (Alice) Hosenfeld of Rochester; and nieces, nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews.

### Augustine Marvin Jr, Agrarian, Civic and Education Activist

Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated Feb. 18 at St. Patrick's Church in Macedon for Augustine Marvin Jr., who died Feb. 15, 1985, at the age of 57.

For 10 years, Mr. Marvin was supervisor of the Town of Macedon, served a year on the board of the Macedon-Central School District, and was prominent in agrarian, civic and church organizations and activities.

He chaired the state Highway Users Conference, was a member of the state Agricultural Resources Commission and the state Electric Commission, and also was an area 4-H leader for 15 years, and a legislative representative of the State Grange.

In addition, Mr. Marvin was an adviser to the State Temporary Water Commission, a member of the American Education Week Committee and a member of

the State Farm Conference Board.

A Democrat, he was first elected town supervisor in 1962, and subsequently served four consecutive terms beginning in 1966.

He began his public career as a dairy farmer, a profession he changed in the late 1960s for the insurance business.

At the time of his death he had served 15 years as the director and secretary of the Ontario-Yates Insurance Co., a Shortsville-based fire-assessment company. He also served on the board of the Monroe Cooperative Fire Insurance Co. for 20 years and on the board of the New York Cooperative Insurance Association.

He had a long-time interest in promoting inter-cultural exchange. In 1956 he worked six months in Guatemala under the egis of the National 4-H Foundation. In addition

he traveled in Mexico and Central America, and his family hosted foreign students.

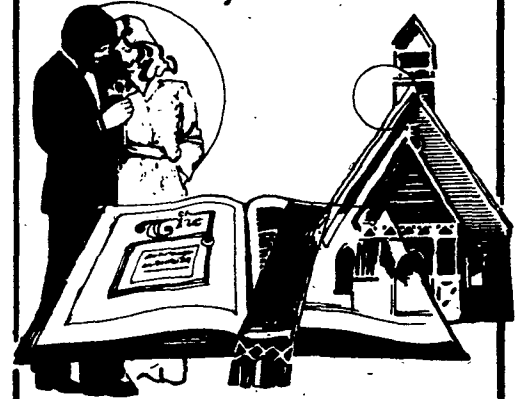
Mr. Marvin was active in many organizations, among them Palmyra Rotary Club, Fairport Grange, Macedon Chamber of Commerce, Macedon Historical Society, Wayne County Historical Society, Macedon and Wayne County Economic Development Corp., and the Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Marvin is survived by his wife, Beverly; a son, Kevin; a daughter, Kimberly; his mother, Rosina; brothers Edmund H., William P., and John F. all of Macedon, Father James J. of Rochester, Frederick W. of Mount Airy, N.C., and Phillip L. of Canandaigua; sisters Margaret Brooks and Catherine of Macedon, Sister Mary SSJ Rochester, and Madeline Klein of Hamlin; and several aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews and cousins.

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
