Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated Feb. 23 for Sister Florentia Smead of the Sisters of St. Joseph who died Feb. 20, 1985 at the age of 93.

Sister Florentia was a native of Geneva and entered the convent from St. Francis de Sales Parish in 1909. She earned her teaching credentials at Nazareth Normal School and embarked on a 60-year service of teaching.

She taught in many diocesan elementary schools, Convent Infirmary in 1974.
