Thaw with China Seen

Rome - There are "motives for hope" that relations between the Catholic Church and the Chinese Communist government will improve, a top Vatican diplomat said March 23. "I have great confidence that things will change," said Archbishop Achille Silvestrini, secretary of the Council for the Public Affairs of the Church. The council is the Vatican agency which handles relations with governments. It is headed by Cardinal Agostino Casaroli, papal secretary of state.

Fight Evil, Youth Urged

Vatican City - Pope John Paul II called on the world's youth to use their strength "not for the struggle of one against another" but for "the struggle against evil." In an apostolic letter titled "To the Youth of the World," the pope called on young people to struggle against "the real evil," which, he said, means a struggle "against everything that offends God." The pope said that includes "injustice, exploitation, falsehood, deceit and...everything that profanes human society and human relationships...(and) every crime against life.'

Pope to Visit Kenya

Rome -- Pope John Paul II plans to visit Africa in mid-August to attend the 43rd International Eucharistic Congress in Nairobi, Kenya, and to visit several other nations, according to Joaquin Navarro-Valls, head of the Vatican press office. The papal itinerary includes Zaire, Togo, Cameroon, Morocco and possibly the Republic of Central Africa. It will be the pontiff's third trip to Africa since becoming pope.

Nation

Linked to Romero Killing

Washington -- A former Salvadoran intelligence official has linked Roberto d'Aubuisson, now head of El Salvador's rightist ARENA Party, to the 1980 assassination of Salvadoran Archbishop Oscar Romero. Col. Roberto Santivanez, director of El Salvador's intelligence agency in 1978-79, said the archbishop's murder was directed by Col. Ricardo Lau, who later became chief of intelligence for U.S.-backed Nicaraguan counterrevolutionaries. He said Lau "was working directly for d'Aubuisson" at that time. At a March 21 Washington press conference, Santivanez said Lau had been paid \$120,000 by wealthy Salvadorans based in Miami. He said the money was passed through El Salvador by d'Aubuisson, a former major in the intelligence agency.

Tougher Pastoral Asked

New York - Participants in an interfaith conference on the U.S. economy March 22-23 urged the U.S. Catholic bishops to make their pastoral on the economy more radical than the first draft issued last fall. "The draft document does not challenge the assumptions of capitalism," said Rabbi Balfour Brickner of the Stephen Wise none of Reform Judgism in New York "I miss the radicalism of a bishops' pastoral such as we saw in the pastoral on peace," he added, referring to the bishops' 1983 pastoral letter, "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response." Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Sullivan of Brooklyn and Rabbi Brickner were leaders of a workshop on the pastoral.

Sanctuary Pledged

(Undated) -- Quoting from the Gospel of St. Matthew, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me," more than 300 Franciscans pledged to offer sanctuary to Central American refugees. Quoting the same passage, Archbishop John R. Quinn of San Francisco took another position, urging temporary legal asylum for the Central Americans "until that day when they can return to their homelands in peace and in safety." Archbishop Quinn and other church officials, including Bishop Rene H. Gracida of Corpus Christi, Texas, U.S. Maryknoll sisters, brothers, priests and lay missioners, and the Commission on Social Justice of the San Francisco Archdiocese urged that Central Americans be granted extended voluntary departure status. Extended voluntary departure would allow refugees to stay temporarily in the United States until it is safe for them to return home.

'Anarchy' Predicted

Washington - Permitting the church-based sanctuary movement to hide fleeing Central Americans would create 'anarchy," Alan C. Nelson, director of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, said at a March 19 press conference.
