'Singing Nun' a Suicide

Wavre, Belgium -- Jeanine Deckers, 52, who as The Singing Nun rose to fame with the song "Dominique," committed suicide during the weekend of March 30, police said. They said Miss Deckers and an unidentified female companion died of an overdose of sedatives. Police found the bodies April 1 in the town of Wavre, 14 miles southeast of Brussels, Belgium, after receiving a phone call from neighbors. Friends said the second woman and Miss Deckers, who was almost penniless when she died, had been upset when government spending cuts had forced the closing of a children's home they ran.

Fr. Kluiters Body Found

(Undated) -- The body of a Dutch Jesuit missionary kidnapped in Lebanon March 14 was found April 1 in a ravine near the village of Nabha in the Bekaa Valley of eastern Lebanon. The body of Jesuit Father Nicolas Kluiters, 44, was badly decomposed, and his hands were tied behind his back. A Lebanese security spokesman said almost 20 foreigners have been kidnapped in Lebanon since the beginning of 1984, but Father Kluiters washe first known to be killed by his abductors.

Chile Probe Asked

Vatican City -- Archbishop Juan Fresno Larrain of Santiago, Chile, has asked for a thorough investigation into the murders of an archdiocesan official and two other people who had been considered opponents of Chile's military government, Vatican Radio reported April 2. The archbishop expressed the church's "energetic and indignant condemnation" of the killings. The three men were found dead and with signs of torture on their bodies March 30 after being kidnapped several days before by armed men. The three people killed were Jose Manuel Parada, an official of the archdiocesan human rights agency, the Vicariate of Solidarity; Manuel Guerrero Caballos, president of the Santiago chapter of the Chilean educators' association; and Santiago Nattino Allende, a printer. Several other government opponents were killed or kidnapped at about the same time.

Nation

Sandinistas Likened to Cuba

Miami -- The Sandinista rulers of Nicaragua are following Cuba's path of Marxism, Archbishop Marcos McGrath of Panama City said during a visit to Miami. He also warned that some religious groups abroad are being duped into funding some Nicaraguan Catholics who are spreading Marxist propaganda under the guise of Christian liberation theology. The Panamanian churchman said Central America needs committed, trained Christians in the political and economic arenas to fill the gap between ultra-capitalist and Marxist alternatives. "I think if there had been political leaders formed in Christian thought in Nicaragua, it wouldn't have had the takeover by Marxist forces," he said.—

Pastoral to Be Delayed

Washington -- The final text of the U.S. bishops' pastoral letter on the economy will be delayed until 1986, it was announced April 1. A second draft, originally due this spring, will be delayed until September. The new plan could lead to a special 1986 spring meeting of the bishops just to debate and vote on the economic pastoral. Otherwise the vote would probably come at the bishops' regular fall meeting in November 1986. Completion of the economic pastoral was originally scheduled for this November, with a full second draft due this spring for discussion at a June national meeting of the bishops in Collegeville, Minn. But many bishops wanted more time to take "full advantage of the rich debate," said Bishop James Malone of Youngstown, Ohio, president of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and U.S. Catholic Conference.

300 at Atlanta Encuentro

Atlanta -- The regional encuentro in Atlanta was part of a process that will enable Hispanics to "raise their prophetic voices" for the church, according to the priest organizing the national pastoral encuentro. More than 300 representatives of dioceses in the southeast region attended the March 21-24 Atlanta encuentro, or encounter. Father Juan Romero, national coordinator of the third Hispanic encuentro, said the meeting was part of a process that began at the parish and diocesan level and will culminate at the Washington gathering Aug. 15-18. Proposals on evangelization, education, social justice, youth and formation of leaders, formulated at the diocesan and regional levels, will be presented.
