

Sunday's Readings: Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48; 1 John 4:7-10; John 15:9-17

This week's readings speak of a community, with no exceptions. Peter's baptism of Cornelius and his family broke the Jewish predominence of the early Church. Gentiles were invited as well! Both the First Letter of John and John's Gospel focus on the value of love and its importance in the lives of human beings. This is "real," self-sacrificing love: "Love, then, consists in this: not that we have loved God, but that God has loved us and has sent his Son as an offering for our sins."

The strange aspect of our present-day society is that we have songs of love, poetry of love, love stories (just look at the cards sent for Sunday, Mothers' Day!) and yet, love is a fleeting moment. It does not seem a high priority for most people. The struggle of love, oftentimes, is a struggle for reconciliation — to genuinely love with a forgiving heart. This, then, becomes our Easter focus.

Reconciliation is so often relegated to the Lenten season. People forget that we live lives that are in constant need of the refreshment that reconciliation can bring them. The beauty of Mothers' and Fathers' days is that of taking time for another person. Would that this could be done everyday! Project:

1. pray for those who say they cannot forgive;

2. extend a loving hand to someone whom you may have offended, or who may have offended you:

3. search your own heart, see what must be reconciled in order that love is authentic.
