Father Lavery explained that when his mother was writing her will, he had urged her to leave him out as he would be taken care of by the Basilian order. But after her death, he found that he had been included in the will nonetheless, so he used the money to start the scholarship.

He said he was deeply grateful to the diocese and friends gathered to honor him, and said that with humility he would "offer the event to Almighty God for his parents and for you all."


Father Laverv recounted several anecdotes from his years at Fisher — including when in 1963 he had hosted at the college the delegates from the World Council of Churches, which held its annual convention in Rochester that year.

He concluded by thanking the audience for their contributions to the fund and for having honored him. He also expressed his gratitude to those who worked to make the dinner possible.

A team from Nazareth College won honorable mention in the U.S. Department of Education's first Mathematical Competition in Modeling. Members of the team are seniors Lori Board of Victor and Donna Conte of Chili, and Elaine Abbott, a teacher-certification candidate from Brighton.

More than 150 teams took part in the contest, but only the top 38 won honorable mention or higher awards. Asked to build a mathematical model to maintain a strategic reserve of a rare material in the U.S., the team prepared a six-page solution paper complete with graphs and charts. James Bradley, chairman of mathematics and computer science at Nazareth, was the contest's local coordinator.
