Nazareth College Computer Camp

Children between the ages of 8-12 will not only have a chance to learn computer programming, word processing and graphics at the Nazareth College Computer Camp, but they'll also have something to show for three weeks of effort.

"Most camps put the emphasis on programming per se," said Lois Bennett of Pittsford, the camp director. "Our students will be learning skills for a particular project, word processing and graphics to create a newspaper."

Every weekday from Monday, July 8-Friday, July 26, campers will be at work from 9 a.m.-noon in the college's Macintosh Lab, Smyth Hall, Room 24. They will learn to program in LOGO and use the Bank Street Writer word processing system, both on Apple microcomputers, and will use Macintosh microcomputers for graphics. Ten computers will be available for a maximum of 20 campers. The cost of the three-week session is \$224.

Bennett is an adjunct faculty member at Nazareth and holds a master's degree in education and computer science from Hunter College. She is also president and founder of Teach Yourself by Computer Software, Inc. of Pittsford. Assisting her with the camp will be John O'Gorman of Hilton, a 1985 Nazareth graduate, and Kate MacMillan of Victor, a student at the college.

Gospel Music Workshop

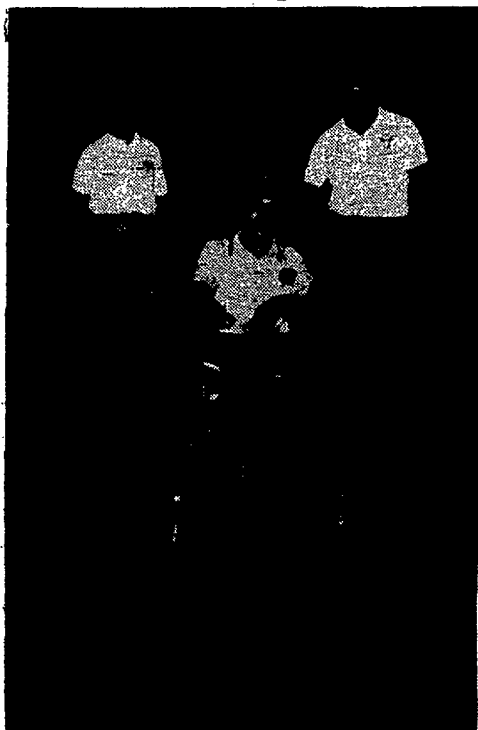

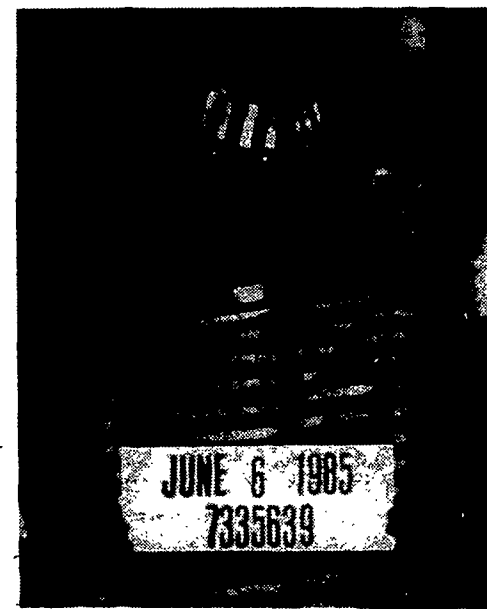
