#### Jenco's Release Sought

Bishop Daniel P. Reilly, chairman of Catholic Relief Services' (CRS) board of directors, has reiterated the agency's appeal for the release of Father Lawrence M. Jenco. Jenco, the CRS Lebanon program director, was kidnapped in Beirut on January 8, 1985, and is believed to be held by the Islamic Holy War group. He is one of seven Americans kidnapped individually in Beirut during the past year.

Bishop Reilly has written to Secretary of State George P. Schultz, urging that work for Jenco's release be given high priority since the 50-year-old member of the Servite order was diagnosed with a heart condition shortly before his abduction. Jenco has been with CRS since 1981, serving in Yemen and Thailand before his assignment to Lebanon last fall.

#### **Basketball Clinic**

Kowalik's Princeton women's team shared the Ivy-league championship with Brown University and posted an overall record of 15-11. A 1975 graduate of SUNY Brockport, she coached the St. Lawrence University women's team before her appointment to Princeton.

Coach of the U.S. Naval Academy team, Evans was formerly assistant coach at SUNY Geneseo. He was named Eastern College Athletic Conference South Coach of the Year following the 1984-85 season.

Fitch has been coaching at Fairport High School for 17 seasons and won the Section 5 championship in 1975. A first-team NAIA All-American guard from East Texas State University, he was named to a U.S. All-Star team and played in the Pan-Am Games tryouts on the NAIA team.

As Nazareth head coach, Nelson has compiled a record of 42-12, and was named East Region Coach of the Year in 1983-84 when his team won the region's Division III championship. Before coming to Nazareth, he was RIT head coach for three seasons.

Chipman's University of Pittsburgh team was 17-12 this past season, finishing fifth in the Big East Conference. Highlighting the season was a 23-point conference victory over eventual national champion, Villanova in the final regular season game.

#### Witness For Peace



#### **Michael Fund Walkathon**



## Old St. Monica's School Transformed



At 96, it needs two to hold it up. Father Robert Gaudio and B.J. Kleinhans support a 96-year-old collection basket presented to the new pastor of St. Monica's Church. The basket was discovered between the walls of the old school building as it was being renovated to become the Genesee Street Child Care Center.

During his tenure as Bishop of Rochester, Bernard J. McQuaid told a young priest, Father John P. Brophy, to go out beyond the wheat fields and build a church. Though ordained only three years before, Father Brophy did just that.

The cornerstone for St. Monica's, the 17th Catholic church to be erected in Rochester, was laid on Sept. 18, 1896. Dedication was the following January 1, 1899. As was the custom then, four large classrooms were located on the first floor and the church on the second at the corner of Monica and Genesee streets, in what was then the extreme southwest area of the city. The building cost a total of \$9,995.

In July 1984, Esther C. Kleinhans, president of Home and Family Child Care, Inc., purchased old St. Monica's School and reopened it as the Genesee Street Child Care Center. The center operates 24 hours a day, 364 days a year, and has the capacity to be the largest single-site child care center in New York state. In contrast to the original building's cost, renovating just the kitchen for the child care center cost \$25,000. While the building was being refurbished, two of the original church collection baskets were found between the walls. Father Robert Gaudio, who was recently named St. Monica's pastor, was presented with one of the baskets. In a formal letter accompanying the gift, B.J. Kleinhans, director of the center wrote: "It dates back to 1899. It worked then. With it (is) our fond wish that it helps you realize the same measure of success in 1985 and the years to come."

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Sister Angela summarized the evening by saying "Families do not say good-bye — they have reunions."

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
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
