Raising voices in praise

Gospel forces join in benefit concert

Power was the operative word at a gospel music concert on Saturday afternoon in Immaculate Conception Church. Five choirs and nine soloists raised their voices in praise and the rewards were immediately apparent. The Mother Cabrini Circle, in a departure from its traditional fund raisers — dinners, teas and sales — made \$400 at the door with some proceeds still to be collected.

Those who sing and those who listen are more closely united by gospel's participatory style than almost any other kind of music. Saturday's diverse group came from St. Bridget's Church on Rochester's north side and Immaculate Conception on the south. The Bible Way Healing Temple Sanctuary Choir and Mount Olivet Baptist Church Choir were there as was the Edwin Hawkins Choir, Rochester Chapter. Some soloists were choir members, while others — Sandra Smith, Sirenia Gospel Singer and Jeannette Rowe, to name a few — came alone. William Johnson, Rochester's Urban League president served as master of ceremonies. And past, present and future beneficiaries of the Mother Cabrini's scholarship fund, which helps to send black students to Catholic high schools, got more than just a financial boost. Altogether, it was cooperation on an unprecedented level according to Father Bob Werth of St. Bridget's.

The music's power was most evident in the lack of words participants could summon to describe it. "It was great, just great!" said Delaine Hall, one of the event's organizers.
