Ministry Conference

Bishop Kenneth E. Untener, STD, of the Diocese of Saginaw, Mich., will be featured at the Fall Ministry Conference on Tuesday, Oct. 15, in Waterloo. The Bishop will discuss skills and qualities needed by ministers in implementing shared responsibility.



A native of Detroit, Bishop Untener regularly gives retreats to priests and theological/pastoral talks around the country. He was ordained to the priesthood

in 1963. After parish work and service in the chancery, he was sent to Gregorian University, where he earned his doctorate in theology. Returning to Detroit, he served in the clergy office and in 1977 was appointed rector of St. John's Seminary in Plymouth, Mich. In 1980, he was named Bishop of the Diocese of Saginaw.

Bishop Matthew H. Clark will lead a panel discussion on shared responsibility at the diocesan level in the afternoon along with a followup speech from Bishop Untener.

Fisher/More Symposium

St. John Fisher College will host a symposium on the lives of St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 9 and 10. In observing the anniversaries of their deaths, the symposium will focus on themes of personal courage and education.

Wednesday evening at 8 p.m., Father James McConica, CSB, president of the University of St. Michael's College in Toronto, will speak on "Fisher and Cambridge" in St. Basil Hall Auditorium. A reception will follow.

Thursday at 2:30 p.m., Hans A. Schieser,

professor of education at DePaul University in Chicago, will deliver "Education for Civil Courage: The Examples of Thomas More and John Fisher" in the Lavery Library.

Father Germain Marchadour, professor in the department of modern languages at the Universite Catholique de l'Oest in Angiers, France, will present "Thomas More's Debt to John Fisher" in St. Basil Hall Auditorium at 8 p.m. on Thursday evening.

Father John R. Cavanaugh, CSB, professor of English at St. John Fisher College, will serve as moderator for the symposium which is free and open to the public.

Bonhoeffer Retrospective

Dr. Robert J. Page, professor of theology at Colgate Rochester Divinity School, will present the first lecture of the Spiritual Life Forum series on Monday, Oct. 7, at 8:30 a.m. in the auditorium of the divinity school, 1100 S. Goodman St., Rochester.

The lecture will focus on the life and thought of Lutheran theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer who, as an outspoken critic of the Third Reich, was executed by Nazi captors in May, 1945.

"The seeds of contemporary liberation theology are to be found in Bonhoeffer's writings," according to Dr. Page who has

long been drawn to the works of Bonhoeffer.

The Spiritual Life Forum lectures, jointly sponsored by the Colgate Rochester Divinity School and St. Bernard's Institute, will use "Tensions Between Community and Charism" as the unifying theme for the 1985-86 series of four Monday morning lectures.

In addition to the Bonhoeffer presentation, the free, public series will examine the life and contributions of Rabbi Arthur Heschel, ecumenist, on November 18, and Arthur Michael Ramsey, archbishop of Canterbury, on March 10.

NICA Trial

Nine members of the Nicaraguan Invasion Contingency Action (NICA) arrested in the lobby of the Federal Building in Rochester for disorderly conduct June 12 go on trial Tuesday, Oct. 15. They plan to base their defense on their first amendment right to peaceably assemble and bear witness to unjust government policy — justification of upholding a greater law. Judge Schwartz has accepted defense with qualification.

Eleven other NICA members, arrested on a charge of trespassing in Congressman Fred Eckert's office in May, will offer the defense of justification — that the situation in

Nicaragua represented an emergency and so warranted their action — at their trial beginning Tuesday, Oct. 8. Judge Walter LeFebvre "Inevitable Revolution" Rick Brody past assistant attorney general for N.Y. state.
