Diocesan groups to review pastoral draft

Fifteen parishes will participate in the formal diocesan review process when the second draft of the U.S. bishops' pastoral "Catholic Social Teaching and the U.S. Economy" is released next week. Jim Lund, a member of the diocesan steering committee on the pastoral, was surprised by the response since the committee expected between eight and ten parishes to take part.

"I am really pleased with the number of people willing to take this on," he said.

In addition to parishes that have expressed interest, a consultative panel formed in the fall of 1985, diocesan staff and the financial advisory board, ad hoc regional groups and the Rochester Religion and Labor Coalition

will also review the document. Reactions to the draft will be voiced by representatives of each reviewing group at a meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 6, with Bishops Matthew H. Clark and Dennis W. Hickey. The U.S. Bishops will meet in Washington, D.C., beginning on November 11.

Lund said that the consultation process is limited by the lack of time between the draft's release and the bishops' meeting in November, where reaction will be reported.

Bishop establishes fund to aid earthquake victims

Expressing a deep concern for the human and spiritual needs of the victims of the Mexican earthquake, Bishop Matthew H. Clark established last week a fund to provide financial support for them.

"Since Thursday (Sept. 19) we have witnessed the scenes of devastation and human tragedy that have occurred in Mexico due to the earthquake," Bishop Clark said. "As an expression of concern and solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Mexico, I am establishing a fund to help address the immediate and long-range needs of these people," he continued.

The bishop made a contribution of \$500 to establish the fund.

As of Friday, Sept. 27, a total of \$3,320

had been collected by the fund.

In addition to his concern for the people affected by the Mexican earthquake, Bishop Clark also expressed thankfulness for the safe return of missionaries from the Diocese of Rochester who were in Mexico City at the time the earthquake occurred.

The bishop has asked all parishes in the diocese to remember the earthquake victims in their prayers.
