The Jesus Prayer

It was dawn. Daylight was slowly filling the room. John was not sleeping. He'd been up all night thinking, still trying to sort out what had happened over the past two days. A sick feeling came over him as he remembered again. Jesus, his best friend, was gone. John still couldn't believe it. His own

people, the Jews, had killed Jesus. They had crucified Him. And what a strange prayer Jesus had uttered as He hung there on the cross! John had been standing at the foot of the cross just then with Mary, Jesus' mother. He had heard the prayer very clearly. There was no mistaking the words. Jesus had said, "Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing.'

Even after all that had happened to Him, Jesus still found it in His heart to pray for those who had done this awful thing to Him. To pray for enemies? -

Prayer had always been important to Jesus, as it was for any devout Jew. But there was something very special about the prayers of Jesus.

John remembered the time that Jesus had preached to 5,000 people. It was hot and dry, and the people had been there all day. John feared that they would collapse from exhaustion on the journey back home. But Jesus had taken care of all that. Someone had brought up five loaves and two fishes for Jesus. He had taken them and, after praying, He told the apostles to distribute the food to the people. All 5,000 people had eaten and gone away happy. It was late, and Jesus sent His apostles away, too. He went up into the mountains then, all alone, to pray

Another time, Jesus had gone to the home of Martha and Mary to see their brother, Lazarus, who was very sick. Mary had rushed out to greet them. "Lord," she said, "if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

Jesus went to the tomb of Lazarus. He prayed to His father and then told the apostles to roll back the stone in front of the tomb. Lazarus had been raised from the dead!

Once, when all of the apostles had been gathered around him, they asked Jesus to teach them how to pray. Jesus had answered, "Your father knows the things you need before you ask Him. So when you pray, you should pray like this:

Our Father who is in heaven, Praised be your name. Your kingdom come, Your will be done On earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread And forgive us our sins, As we forgive those who do wrong to us. Lead us not into temptation,

But deliver us from evil. Yes, if you forgive others for the things they do wrong, then your Father in heaven will also forgive you for the things you do wrong. But if you don't forgive the wrongs of others, then your Father in heaven will not forgive the wrong things you do" (Matthew

6/8-15). Forgive those who do wrong to us? That's why Jesus had prayed for those who had crucified Him. John remembered then, that last night in the garden before Jesus' death. Jesus had asked His apostles to stay and pray with Him. And they had all fallen asleep and let Jesus down when He had needed them most. "Jesus, forgive me," John prayed.

There was a pounding on the door. It was Mary Magdalene. "John, hurry, come quick!" she cried. "They've taken Jesus out of the tomb. I don't know where they could have put the body." . . .
