# Local celebrations planned for Martin Luther King Day

As the first national observance of Martin-Luther King Jr.'s birthday approaches (January 20), diocesan officials are urging a wider celebration of the holiday by schools and parishes outside the black community. Foward that end, the Office of Liturgy and the Division of Urban-Services are sending each parish liturgical suggestions for the weekend of January 18 and 19 and information on events planned for the holiday.

Immaculate Conception, Rochester, and St. Bridget's parishes are two places that need no urging. St. Bridget's tradition of celebrating Martin I uther King's birthday on a grand scale will continue this year. A memorial service and gospel music tribute on Sunday, Jan. 12, will feature - at last count - 10 gospel choirs, including those from Immaculate Conception and St. Bridget's parishes. Greer Gordon, the assistant director of adult education and formation for the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C., will also speak on the historic movement started by Dr. King and its theological involvements. The celebration begins at 4 p.m. and admission is free. For information, call (716)454-4236.

Immaculate Conception Parish will kick off its annual observance of Black History Month with a celebration of Martin Luther King's birthday at the 11 a.m. Mass, Sunday, Jan. 19. The theme for the Mass will be "Hush, Somebody's Calling My Name," with music by the Immaculate Conception choir. City Councilwoman Maxine Childress-Brown will be the homilist, and the storyteller will be Robert Dinkle.

Special Sunday liturgies will continue at Immaculate Conception throughout the following month. On Sunday, Jan. 26, the theme will be "Black Church" with the Rev. Andrew Gibson as homilist, Robert Dinkle as storyteller and music by the A.M.F. Zion Church choir.

Dr. King was born January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Ga. His leadership of the civil rights movement during the 1960s was recognized when he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize

in 1964. On November 2, 1983, a bill was finally signed into law establishing the third Monday in January as a federal holiday honoring King's birthday. The bill had been introduced in every Congressional session since King's assassination in 1968.
