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Dr. Robert McCambridge, who has been at Nazareth College during the period of its greatest growth, will retire June 1, 1986 as vice president of planning and development. "Finding a successor for Dr. McCambridge is going to be a major concern for the second semester," said Dr. Rose Marie Beston, Nazareth president. "Although no one can take his place, we will try to find a worthy successor."

McCambridge came to Nazareth in 1973 from the New York State Education Department where he was assistant commissioner for higher education planning. At Nazareth, his responsibilities have included fund raising, public relations, alumni relations, institutional planning and government relations.


For the past four years, Henderson has been conducting a summer foreign exchange program for Mercy students, exclusively for visits to Japan.
