# The Wisdom of Solomon

King Solomon was known as a fair and just ruler of Israel. As a youth, he learned a very important lesson from the sages of the day. A sage was a person of learning and wisdom, someone wellversed in Jewish law and scriptures.

Solomon learned that faith and trust in God was the first step to becoming wise. A wise person humbled himself in the sight of God. Solomon knew that God had made him and knew all about him, so he was able to trust God with his life

King Solomon had a great hope for the people of Israel. "I want to make the simple-minded wise!" he said. For this reason, Solomon wrote proverbs. Proverbs are short sayings that teach lessons. about life. Solomon wanted to show the people how they should behave toward God and toward each other. The proverbs also teach about just having good old-fashioned common sense. It has been said that Solomon wrote more than 3,000 proverbs during his lifetime!

The Book of Proverbs is found in the Old Testament just after the Book of Psalms, which was written mainly by King David, Solomon's father. Thirty-one chapters are contained in the Book of Proverbs. Most of them were written by King Solomon approximately 10 centuries before the birth of Christ. After his death, Solomon was known as the greatest sage of Israel.

We will be exploring the Book of Proverbs during the next few weeks. To

help us apply them to our own lives, each proverb will be explained through the telling of a fable, a very short story that also teaches. The fable was one of the very earliest story forms.

### Fable One

A fox was walking down the street when he saw a farmer carrying his grain to market in a large sack. The farmer seemed tired from carrying the heavy load, and the fox saw an opportunity for himself.

"Kind sir," began the fox. "Alas, I find myself to be very much in debt lately.


