'Our main concern was that we would be able to communicate with him," remembers Charlie. "But he speaks English very well." The Burkes were looking forward to the knowledge they would gain of Swiss culture, and hoped Ady would benefit as well.

According to Charlie, Ady speaks frequently of his family and even had some slides of his family at home. Charlie says he wouldn't mind going to Switzerland himself


nervous coming to America. He has been to six other countries, but never to America, so he was intent on discovering what the American Dream really is.

"The American Dream viewed by Europeans isn't reality," he said. "Most of what we see is in the movies. It's more of a California image. Here in Elmira, I've learned that American life isn't like Hollywood portrays it."

Although Ady chose the U.S. as his host country, he was not able to choose what city he would be staying in or what school he would attend. However, he is pleased with Notre Dame and pleasantly surprised with similarities between his host family and his family in Lake Lucerne.

Ady really enjoys life at N.D. During the fall sports season, he was involved in football and wrestling. Naturally, Ady is adept at skiing, and has visited Greek Peak as well as the famous slopes of Vermont. class at Notre Dame, he will have to take still more when he returns to Switzerland.

Ady has three more years of schooling ahead of him before he can go on to a university or technical school. He hopes to study agriculture in Zurich at that point.

Besides keeping up on current events in Switzerland through letters from home, Ady keeps himself up to date on what's happening in the U.S., politically and otherwise. When asked his opinion of President Reagan, Ady declared he liked the President. "He's not like Carter at all; he says what he thinks and isn't overly concerned with diplomacy.
