Quakers romp A night to forget for Little Irish

Section 5 high school basketball teams have to travel a long, hard road in order to play in a championship game at the War Memorial.

Saturday night, it appeared that road had taken a bigger toll on the Little Irish of Aquinas than it had taken on the Franklin Ouakers.

After battling to a 14-12 lead after one quarter against Franklin, Aquinas was overpowered 19-6 in the second stanza, and the Quakers never looked back in an awesome 67-48 win.

Franklin, 17-5, represents Section 5 Class A in the Western Regionals at the Buffalo Auditorium this Saturday night at 7:15 p.m.

It was a season to remember but a night to forget for Mike Ruff's squad, who had recorded two major upsets in this year's tournament by knocking off defending champion East and No. 3 Webster, before falling to the "run-and-gun" Quakers.

After Wakili Moore nailed three corner jump shots for almost half of the Little Irish points in the opening quarter, Franklin coach Trent Jackson made defensive adjustments which virtually shut the senior guard out the rest of the way. (He did, however, add two free-throws in the fourth quarter when the game was out of reach)

"We used a trap defense to double team Moore because you can't give him any room to shoot, he'll burn you every time." Jackson said, atter his Quakers captured their second sectional crown in three years.

Jackson admitted he was somewhat surprised by the margin of victory, but discounted the revenge factor (Aquinas had defeated Franklin 76-71 earlier in the season) for his team's romp and attributed it to his squad's tenacious and diligent play.

"We just wanted to win this one, that other game didn't matter," Jackson said. 'We worked hard for this win, and that's what sectionals is all about.

Eric Thomas was a one-man dynamo for the Quakers in the second quarter when he poured in eight of his 16 points for the night. Those eight points were two more than the entire Aquinas squad could muster as it was left flat-footed on numerous occasions and trailed 31-20 at halftime.

Aquinas' Chris Thomas (no relation to Eric) was 80 percent of his team's offense in the third quarter, when he scored eight of its 10 points. But the two points that Thomas didn't get stood out most. It was a sequence of events with 6:30 to go in the third quarter that typified the night, not for Thomas, but for the Little Irish.

An uncontested drive to the basket was marred when the 6-2 senior "muffed a stuff" that would have most definitely inspired his team as well as the rather quiet Aquinas fans.

On the ensuing rebound, teammate Eric Loewenguth missed a seemingly simple layup that would have narrowed the lead to 10, after Franklin had led by as many as 13. It was that kind of night for the Little Irish.

Eric Thomas added insult to injury at the end of the quarter when he nipped the buzzer to give the Quakers a 45-30 bulge going into the final eight minutes.

It was show time for Franklin in the final quarter as Aquinas resembled a defenseless boxer on the ropes in front of the announced crowd of 5,334. The Quakers upped the lead to as many as 24, before the Little Irish trimmed it before time ran out. Franklin's 6'4" center Tori Poindexter was "chairman of the boards" for the Quakers, as he grabbed 10 rebounds for the night and was an intimidating force inside."

Three players from both squads were honored in post-game ceremonies naming the 1986 All-Tournament Team. Paul Mancarella, Moore and Thomas were tabbed for Aquinas, while Poindexter, Ken McLain and Most Valuable Player Tim Washington were named from Franklin. The 5'10" Washington scored 10 of his team's 12 points in the opening quarter and had 16 points and 10 rebounds for the night.

AQUINAS EARNED ITS WAY into the sectional final with an exciting come-frombehind win over Webster, 63-60, in the "big house" Wednesday, Feb. 26.

The night did not begin on such a good note for coach Ruff's squad, which showed up for the game in its home maroon colors rather than its visiting white uniforms. In a classy and sympathetic gesture, Warrior coach Bill O'Rourke Jr. declined the five

O'Rourke's squad was anything but sympathetic once the game started as they jumped out to a quick 4-0 lead, thanks to Steve Dewey's two jump-shots. Dewey scored nine points in the first quarter alone en route to a 21-point evening.

The Little Irish regained their composure and led 17-15 after one.

Aquinas' shooting went cold in the second quarter, while Webster's Dewey and 6'7" senior center John Szumiloski began to dominate play in powering the Warriors to a seven-point lead, 33-26. Webster's G.T. Helbig also enjoyed a fine quarter, nailing eight of his 13 points.

Aquinas senior Mancarella domineered

play in the third stanza, scoring 10 points and pulling the Little Irish to within two after three quarters, 47-45. The gutsy center hit consecutive hook shots in the final minute to give Aquinas all-important momentum heading into the final eight niqutes.

The score was tied three times in the first 3:30 of the final period, until Mancarella took things into his own hands once again and converted yet another running hook shot in the lane to put Aquiñas ahead, 55-53.
