"I have a lot of respect for the program," Myers said. "We won the game with great hearts and great athletes."


Myers called Notre Dame (17-6) the best basketball team Odessa-Montour had played.

Coalition contrasts military aid, budget cuts

A coalition of Rochester's religious and community leaders have called upon local legislators to vote against Central American military aid and to override the proposed deferral of \$500 million in Community Development Block Grant funds.

The Congregational Council of the Sisters of Mercy and the Central Administration of the Sisters of St. Joseph, along with such individuals as Sister Muriel Curran, diocesan vicar for religious, and Victor Bartolotta, a Mt. Carmel Parish outreach worker, were among those who signed the statement, issued at a press conference Friday, Feb. 21.

The statement noted that the amount of community development funds President Ronald Reagan has deferred until fiscal 1987 is roughly equivalent to the amount he proposes to spend on military aid to El Salvador, Honduras and the Nicaraguan

"What the President is telling the American people is that we cannot afford to rebuild our cities, preserve our older buildings or maintain housing affordable to low/moderate-income persons, but that we can afford to destroy the cities, towns and villages of Nicaragua and El Salvador,' wrote Councilwoman Maxine Childress-Brown, spokeswoman for the group.

Among the legislators contacted by the group were Congressman Fred Eckert, Frank Horton, and John LaFalce and senators Alphonse D'Amato and Daniel P. Moynihan.

In addition to deferring the block development grants, President Reagan's proposed budget eliminates the Urban Development

Action Grant Program, through which the City of Rochester has received \$5.3 million per year over the past eight years. Overall, the city would lose up to \$8 million next year in budget cuts.

The Cynthia Fitzpatrick Housing Cooperative, where the press conference was located, is one housing project funded by those federal dollars.

Meanwhile, the president is asking for \$60-\$100 million for the contra rebels in Nicaragua, an increase of nearly 400 percent. He also proposes a 24-percent increase in military aid to El Salvador and a 50-percent increase in aid to Honduras.

Daytime programs will be held in the school's Remington Lounge. All lectures are free and open to the public.


