# Holy Family: a new name reflects reorganized Elmira schools

Holy Family Catholic School System may be an unfamiliar name to Chemung County residents, but it won't be for long.

That's because, when Elmira-area Catholic schools reopen next fall, they will offer not only a new configuration, but also a new name.

With the beginning of the schools' registration period Monday, March 10, Holy Family will crop up on posters and brochures, television and radio public service announcements, in bulletins and even at weekend Masses, where parent representatives will describe the schools.

More than a name, Holy Family is also an image chosen unanimously by members of the Chemung County General Education Board at its February meeting and approved by diocesan officials last week.

"We wanted to promote the idea of the Catholic family and the unity of the system as a family," explained Jim Mirando, board president. "We had intended to do this (the name change) at a later time, but the pastors expressed that this is the right time for a new name."

The name change proposal by pastors will take effect this summer and in September, 1986, when Elmira's Catholic schools

Father Schmidt was principal speaker at this program attended by representatives from various churches in Hornell and the area. reopen, they will consolidate from four to three buildings, known as: Holy Family primary building (St. Mary's), prekindergarten through grade 3; Holy Family intermediate building (Our Lady of Lourdes), grades 4-6; and Holy Family junior high (St. Casimir's), grades 7-8. St. Patrick's School building will not re-open next year.

"Holy Family" was selected from among close to 200 names submitted by parents, teachers and students. A subcommittee named by the school board gathered the suggestions and narrowed the choice to three names, on which the board voted Thursday, Feb. 13.

Along with the new name, school board members and administrators hope to spread the word of advantages the reorganzied system will offer and address any concerns parents still have. More than 250 families have already attended presentations by teachers, principals and school board members. So far, Mirando said, it appears that the more parents hear, the better the schools sound.

"There's a lot of enthusiasm," he observed. "We've heard very minimal resistance. I think people have seen from what's going on in Rochester and Corning,



that everyone's going through the same thing. We had our homework done ahead of time, and I think people are beginning to appreciate that." Although many parents were apprehensive about busing, Mirando explained that the schedule presented by the city school district may actually be an improvement for many children. "It's a very good transportation plan — even better than we thought we'd get," he said. Catholic school students will be bused separately, a plan that represents increased cost for the city school district. But 67 percent of the cost will be reimbursed by New York State, Mirando said.

Parents, teachers, school board members and administrators are now focusing their energy on registration since enrollment will be the critical factor in determining future tuition rates.

More than 1,000 Holy Family brochures will be sent this month to families already enrolled in Catholic schools as well as to families of potential pre-kindergarteners, first-graders and sixth-graders. On Tuesday, March 18, sixth graders now enrolled in Elmira's Catholic schools will visit Holy Family junior high building and on Friday, March 21, sixth-graders from public schools will be invited to an orientation.




an excessive amount of time praying not to God but to a particular saint. Then the saint becomes more important than God.
