Sensational sophs power Nazareth past Lady Kings, 17-7

Nazareth's sensational sophomores, Amy Budd and Lesley Salladin, batted in four runs each, as coach Dave Pisano's squad rattled two Bishop Kearney pitchers with 17 runs and 15 hits in a 17-7 romp.

The Lady Kings' loss not only hurts their chances of taking the Private-Parochial League, but also fails to help Kearney's chances for good seeding in the sectional tournament which begins this week.

Coach Linda D'Onofrio's squad looked nothing like the team that defeated defending Section 5 Class AA Cardinal Mooney 2-1 a week earlier against Nazareth.

The score was already 3-1 in the third when junior Paula Short opened the inning (which saw all nine Nazareth starters bat) with a double off of Ann Marie Rivaldo. Rivaldo replaced an ineffective Kelli Curcio who failed to get one batter out in the first inning before D'Onofrio opted for Rivaldo.

After Jill Cosgrove followed Short with a single to centerfield, sophomore Samantha Scramm plated Short to increase the lead to

Two outs later, Salladin recorded her first RBI when her hard smash over leftfielder Molly Dillon's head made it 5-1.

Budd followed with a bases-loaded triple over Dillon's head, scoring Gina Demaura, Salladin and Samperi to up the margin to six,

Nazareth's senior pitcher Marisa Diliberto plated Budd when she lined a change-up to left center, but was thrown out at third base trying to stretch the hit into a triple.

Eleven Nazareth batters came to the plate in an eight-run fourth inning. There were runners on second and third when Demaura singled Short home from third, to balloon the lead to 10-3. Kasey Compisi made the score 11-3 when she plated Jill Cosgrove. As if the damage wasn't enough, Salladin cleared the bases with a monstrous shot up the alley in left center to make the score 14-3.

Diliberto helped her own cause when she blasted yet another hit over Dillon's head, scoring Salladin, to give Nazareth an insurmountable 15-3 lead.

Short ended the deluge with a single to score Diliberto.





The Lady Kings added three late runs to decrease the margin somewhat.

Pisano's squad could be a possible dark horse in this year's tournament if it can combine Diliberto's usual pitching prowess with a crop of players, mostly sophomores, who hit the ball very well. Inexperience may be the only thing that prevents the young team from doing something big in the tournament.

Once again D'Onofrio's squad is showing its inconsistency in what has been an up-and-down season for Kearney softball.

If D'Onofrio can't get her squad to play the softball it is capable of playing, it could be another early exit from the sectionals for Bishop Kearney.
