Elizabeth Walters of Brighton was presented Genesee Ecumenical Ministries' first award for Outstanding Ecumenical Leadership at the organization's annual dinner meeting on May 29.

Beginning in 1948 with the Ecumenical Study Group of Church Women United, Walters has been active in the ecumenical movement for more than 35 years. She has served on the Board of Church Women United and the Task Force on Courts, which is studying the family court system. Since 1977, she has served on the Women's Interfaith Coalition and is an active member of the Ecumenical Commission of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester. A member of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church on Chili Avenue, she serves as a licensed cup bearer and teacher. For many years, St. Stephen's has maintained an informal covenant with St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church, which is also on Chili Avenue.

The award was presented to Walters by Margery Nurnberg, ecumenical officer of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Rochester.

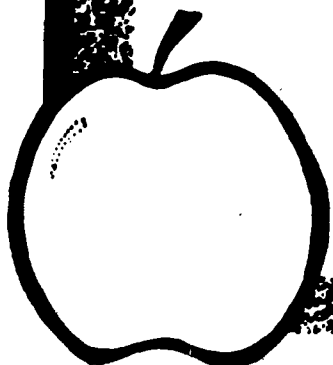
