Cantillana is one of four Chilean women involved in the Mercy Formation Program, which is directed by missionary sisters Jane Kenrick, Kay Schwenzer and Janet Caufield.

A catechist, Cantillana has lived in the congregation as a candidate since 1984. She is the daughter of Eduardo and Maria Cantillana of Santiago.
