## **Buildings** manager stresses need for long-term planning

Since joining the diocesan staff in April of 1985, James Magee, manager of diocesan buildings and properties, has clearly made his mark. His accomplishments range from renovations to the Pastoral Center, to the creation of new offices for the Courier-Journal, to a forthcoming project to assist parishes in planning for the future of their buildings.

In the summer of 1985, 33,000 square feet of space within the Pastoral Center were renovated to provide offices for 10 diocesan departments that had been located elsewhere in the diocese and to accommodate new working arrangements for the Pastoral Center staff.

The space had been vacated one year earlier when the School of the Holy Childhood moved to its own facility in Henrietta. The consolidation of diocesan departments within the 1150 Buffalo Road facility was designed to reduce administrative costs the diocese incurred to maintain the unoccupied space, and to pay rent and utilities at other locations.

Magee and his staff coordinated the renovations, which involved reconstructing parts of all three floors of the building.

Just as the Pastoral Center project was completed, Magee turned his efforts toward planning and design of a new endeavor. In the spring of this year, subcontractors began removing heavy institutional kitchen equipment — carryovers from the days of St. Andrew's Seminary and Kings Preparatory School - from the first floor's west wing. With new walls, lighting and electrical systems, the space became home to the Courier-Journal staff in

According to Mary Bittner, Courier-Journal office manager, Magee, his staff and the subcontractors "took an ugly kitchen and turned it into a beautiful, warm, pleasant working en-

Now that the major projects at the Pastoral Center are finished, Magee is developing means by which to reach out to parishes in need of advice on their buildings. A few rural parishes have consulted him on an individual basis, and he is now working with Father John Mulligan, director of the Division of Urban Services, and architect Richard Randall, AIA, to design a survey on urban parishes' buildings and their maintenance costs.

Once fed into the diocesan computer, the data compiled through the survey will allow parishes to compare their energy costs with those of other parishes of similar size. Magee also hopes to provide parishes with estimates on the life expectancies of current structural components and on the cost of replacements.

"It's going to help them to start planning for the future," Magee said. Based on the results of the computer analysis, parishes will be able to set priorities on capital improvements and plan ahead, rather than having to raise emergency funds when an old roof unexpectedly gives way, he added.

"The parish evaluation is going to be big," said Magee, who previously worked for six years as manager of buildings and properties at the Harley School. He hopes the forthcoming program will assist parishes in assessing their long-term needs and in deciding whether to develop energy-management programs or five-year plans. "It all depends on where you want to go," he said.

"These are obviously a lot of my goals and ideas," Magee concluded. "Parishes should know that these things are available. It's not a full-blown concept yet, but the people who need help should call us."
